TEXAS IS FOR HEARST.

E. W. Davenport, editor of the Breenridge Democrat, says:

"It is amusing, these antics of the Parker managers in trying to impress democratic voters inside or outside of Texas that Parker has even a fighting chance to carry Texas. My county, Stephens, will be particularly solid for Hearst and all the more populous counties of northwest Texas will go the same.

"We are indifferent to the latest attempt to fool the people in the promulgation of Elliot Danforth's belief of what Parker would stand for if nominated. If Parker has to be frightened into permitting second hand statements of what he would stand for to go out to the public then his attitude or opinion would have no interest for the democrats of my section of Texas."

W. A. Shaw, editor of the Texas Farmer, the official organ of the Texas State Grange, has issued an address to the farmers of Texas, in which he says:

"Plainly stated, the issues are simple. Hearst stands for real democracy. He stood for and fought for real democracy, as expressed in the platforms of 1896 and 1900, and he spent more money in the two campaigns than did any hundred of men now fighting him. His political record has always been open, clean and conspicuous. It has never been any trouble to find out where he stood.

"The public knows nothing of Judge Parker's record in the campaigns of 1896 and 1900. Parker is of the Hill-Belmont variety of politicians. Wall street would not encourage or support the candidacy of any man who is for a real democratic administration.

EFFECTS OF ADVERTISING.

A HERALD man had an opportunity last night to note the direct effects of newspaper advertising upon Palestine people. He dropped in at Bratton's, and in the fifteen or twenty minutes he spent there, fourteen people patronized the soda fountain, and nine of the fourteen called for "Coney Island Float." Of course this is a delicious concoction of ices, fruits, etc., but the ad this firm is now running in the HERALD is creating the demand.

Another striking illustration of the effectiveness of newspaper advertising was the vast throng attracted to Branagan & Brannan's last evening. The store was not big enough for the throng, and hundreds were turned away. The announcements of this reception were made only through the daily papers.

There are just a few merchants left in Palestine who are "old fogy" enough to use dodgers exclusively, and that style of advertising is about the least effective of any.

There is no advertising equals newspaper advertising, especially HERALD advertising, as the HERALD visits more Palestine homes daily than can be reached by any other method.

HIT 'EM AGAIN.

The Post is the special custodian of the sphynx boom and claims to be the Texas oracle of the sphynx. In 1896 the erudite gentleman who is furnishing the editorial brains for the Post was a loyal supporter of the lamented William McKinley. He had a perfect right to support Mr. McKinley and he had a perfect right to class all men as anarchists who refused to support McKinley and voted the regular ticket. WELL TO REMEMBER.

How Old Mattresses May Be Made Over at Home.

Perhaps all housekeepers do not know that old mattresses can be made over to be almost as good as new, says a writer in the Christian Work and Evangelist. If they are filled with moss, hair or cotton they can be renovated nicely, but the excelsior and other cheap fillings must be thrown away. After emptying the contents of the tick through a ripped seam in the middle of the top the dust should be thoroughly shaken from the filling. Cotton may be laid on a flat surface—the porch floor is a good place—and whipped with a limber stick to raise the dust, then well shaken. This treatment also lightens the fiber of the cotton and is good for hair and moss.

Moss is much better for a good washing if very dusty. Use a tub of tepid suds. Plunge some of the moss in and swish it around awhile, then wring through a wringer into a tub of clear water. After rinsing it is wrung again and spread on the grass to dry in the hot sun. It should be turned and shaken a few times while drying. Either moss, hair or cotton should be pulled apart until perfectly light before returning it to the tick.

The tick should be well washed and boiled if necessary, then wrung and the inside and well straightened before drying, as it is difficult to iron it very well. In stuffing the mattress spread it on a clean floor and fill the corners first, then the ends, and so until the middle is reached. Be sure to have it very full in the middle, where the most wear will come, else there will soon be very uncomfortable valleys in the bed. Sew up the seam in the top and proceed to tack the mattress, using a long needle and stout twine. Put small pieces of cloth on the twine at each side of the mattress to prevent the twine breaking through the tick.

After the first row of tacking around the edge of the mattress it can be raised upon chairs or a slat bed to make the work easier. It is hard work, but if one has more time than money it will pay to renovate the old mattresses, as they are so much more comfortable when finished.
