## FOUND CURE FOR LEPROSY

Dr. Rost Cultivates Bacillus of the Disease.

New York, July 13.—Capt. E. R. Rost, of the Indian medical service, has succeeded in cultivating the bacillus of leprosy, according to dispatches from Rangoon, Burmah, says a Times special from London. He has made a substance from the cultures which he calls leprolin, and which, when injected into lepers, has marked beneficial action, alleviating the symptoms of the disease. The method of growing the bacillus is to extract the salts from nutrient media, and Capt. Rost discovered that the bacillus will not grow in the presence of the salt. In order to make such nutrient media he instills beef extract soaked in pumice stone in a current of super-heated steam and obtains a medium in which the bacillus of leprosy, and also that of tuberculosis, grows with the greatest ease. Over 100 cases are being treated in Burmah, by injections of this substance and the treatment is also being tried in thirty places in India. Already four cases have been reported cured, and in the great majority of those under treatment the improvement is said to be marked.

## Japanese Losses

London, July 13.—Semi-official advices received today seem to confirm the report that thousands of Japanese were killed in an unsuccessful attempt to take Port Arthur from the land side.

RUSSIAN WARSHIPS ASSISTED

St. Petersburg, July 13.—The general staff announces that Viceroy Alexieff has received a message from Japanese sources that in a big attack on Port Arthur Monday the Japanese were repulsed with severe losses. It is stated that Russian warships emerged and attacked the Japanese simultaneously. The report has caused a sensation. A confirmation and details are anxiously awaited. There is talk of raising the siege.

FAMINE THREATENS RUSSIA

St. Petersburg, July 13.—The prospective failure of crops in some southern provinces, possibly attended with famine and the necessity of adopting relief measures, is beginning to attract attention.

The governments of Kherzon, Bessarabia, Tanrida, Poltava and Kharkoff are principally affected. In the district of Triaspol the peasants have already been compelled to harvest the unripe crops to feed the live stock. Committees have already been appointed to relieve the distress.

The failure of the crops is attributed to the early autumn frosts, insufficient moisture while sowing, the fluctuating weather of the winter, the total absence of snow, the heavy frosts which followed last spring's frosts in May and the infrequency of rains for cereals and hay.

In some districts no rain has fallen. In many parts of Bessarabia cattle are being sold for almost nothing.

EMPEROR WILLIAM'S MESSAGE.

St. Petersburg, July 13.—Emperor William's message of good wishes to the Wiborg regiment is attracting much less attention here than at other capitals. Novoe Vremya says:

"Europe is indeed hungry for a sensation. The message was to the regiment of which Emperor William is honorary colonel, and they find therein the possibility of a breach of neutrality." The paper considers it much ado about nothing.

The Bourse Gazette, a pro-german paper, is the only one which in the message as evidence of "friendly neutrality," de-
