JAPS SANK THE RURIK

Three Ships of the Vladivostok Squadron Engaged by the Japanese.

Washington, August 18.—The Japanese Legation has received a cablegram from Tokyo dated today saying that Admiral Kamamimura reports that our squadron, after five hours' severe fighting with the three ships of the Vladivostok squadron, on the morning of the 14th, in the mouth of Tsushima Island, sank the Rurik. The other two ships, which appeared to have suffered heavily, fled northward. Our damages are slight.

Another cablegram from Tokyo to the legation says:

"The commander of the Takeshiki naval station says that our fleet reported by wireless telegraph that the Vladivostok squadron was sighted at 5:30 a. m. on the 14th. The cruiser Takeshiki subsequently reported that a naval battle is being fought."
