## SHORTAGE IN A. & M. FUNDS

Reason for Discrepancy Is Explained at Austin—Expert Accountant to Be Employed.

Austin, Texas, August 31.—As to the financial affairs of the Agricultural and Mechanical College, the college board at its summer meeting, July 19 and 20, discovered an apparent deficiency amounting to \$14,200.

The facts to be obtained at present are that it was brought about by using certain funds when other funds were exhausted. In other words, if the building fund were exhausted, another fund would be used for this purpose.

This has been going on for 10 or 15 years. A general deficiency in the college general fund brought the matter to light.

Insurance Commissioner Clay, ex-officio member of the board, said this morning: "At the meeting of the board in July it was found that the general fund had been exhausted on account of the various funds having been used for purposes for which there had been no appropriation. The president of the board instructed the employment of an expert accountant to check up the funds of the college from the beginning, and, if a real deficiency existed, to report where and what funds are hit."

Many reports are in circulation, some being very sensational, but the real facts will not be known until the expert accountant's report.

J. A. Harrison is the college book-keeper and will no doubt give out a statement today.

## THE KILLING OF MOSQUITOES

A Brief Summary of Their Habits and What to Do.

Victoria, Texas, Aug. 31.—An eminent physician of this city who is ever thoughtful of the good of others, says that in view of the fact that yellow fever has been reported at Fort Brown, and all precautions should be used to prevent it from spreading, it might serve a useful purpose to reiterate a few pointed facts which the medical profession accepts as scientifically demonstrated in regard to the mosquito theory. He says:

1. It is twelve days after the mosquito has sucked blood from a yellow fever victim before it can communicate the disease to other subjects.

2. That it is five or six days after the bite of the mosquito before the disease develops in the person bitten.

3. That the stegomyia fasciata is the only species of mosquito that can communicate the disease to people.

4. That pyrethrum, commonly known as insect powder, is the best known germicide for ridding rooms of mosquitoes. It should be used in this manner: Remove all curtains or other furniture under which the mosquitoes could hide; place a skillet of live coals in the room tightly closed, and then pour the pyrethrum upon the coals. After it has burned awhile the mosquitoes will become anaesthetized and fall upon the floor apparently dead and they can be brushed up while in this stupor and burned. This, he states, is the simplest and most effective manner of getting these pests out of rooms. He also states that the life of a mosquito is sometimes as long as five months.
