MAY BE OUR NEW RAILROAD

M. K. & T. IS FIGURING ON CONNECTING "LITTLE ORPHAN" WITH THE MAIN LINE.

At the meeting of the M., K. & T. directors in Dallas early in April one of the important matters to be decided upon is the connection of the Trinity division with the main line. Just how this will be done is not known but it is almost certain that an announcement will be made of an extension which will bring this road in connection with the M., K. & T.

Last fall H. C. Rouse, who is president of the Texas system, made an extensive trip through East Texas, avowedly for the purpose of picking out suitable territory in which the M., K. & T. might be extended. In an interview at Denison Mr. Rouse said that plans were being formulated for extensions in that direction, and that it would be necessary to get the Trinity division into the Katy system. He said at that time, however, that nothing definite would be done until the spring meeting.

Since Mr. Rouse's last visit to the state he has succeeded in making financial arrangements which will give him money to carry out his plans. In providing for the new bond issue he undoubtedly had in mind the extensions in East Texas which he made a trip to see about last year.

A number of plans have been made to connect the Trinity division with the main line. At one time there was considerable enthusiasm aroused about a line from Trinity to a point near Waco. Mr. Rouse's close attention to Texas Southern affairs has led many to believe, however, that he contemplates running that line
