## A BRICK FACTORY.

An Enterprise That Is Much Needed  
In This Section of Texas.

The fact will not be disputed by any  
one that a big brick manufacturing  
plant is needed in this section to sup-  
ply the constant demand for brick.  
But the facts about the material for  
making good brick may not be so  
well known. Experiments have been  
made by experts with the clays and  
soils around Palestine and most grat-  
ifying results have been obtained, and  
as fine brick as are made in the  
country have been made. In the  
Board of Trade rooms now there are  
on exhibit some four or five specimen  
brick made from soil within easy ac-  
cess of the city, and on the line of the  
railroad, and these bricks have been  
pronounced of the very highest qual-  
ity by experts to whom they have  
been submitted.

This fact settled, it only remains to  
know how much of a market there is  
for such a factory. Palestine uses a  
great many brick, the I. & G. N. rail-  
road uses a great many, and the towns  
all around us are in the same fix that  
we are—without brick makers, and  
hence are open to a good market.

Men who have made the subject a  
study agree that the conditions are  
very flattering for such an enterprise.  
But the success of such an industry  
waits on some man who is an expert  
in this work, and who has the ability  
and means to operate a plant.

### Building a Siding.

A siding is being put in from the I.  
& G. N. to the oil mill, and a good  
force of men with teams and scrapers  
are at work on the job. A big fill  
has to be made, and it is taking a  
great deal of dirt. The rumor got out  
in the city yesterday that the new  
railroad had begun construction here,  
and many people flocked down to  
where the siding is being put in, only  
to be disappointed that it was not in  
fact a new railroad. However, the  
new railroad will not be far from  
where dirt is now broken for this sid-  
ing.

## KNOWLES' APPOINTMENT.

Will Succeed Skelley As Assistant to  
E. W. Dorris of Central.

The many Palestine friends of Mr.  
Knowles will read with interest the  
following article taken from the Hous-  
ton Post:

W. C. Knowles, for eight years con-  
nected with the passenger department  
of the Missouri, Kansas and Texas  
railway, has been appointed assistant  
city passenger and ticket agent of the  
Central-East and West lines, vice Ar-  
thur Skelley, promoted.

E. W. Dorris, city passenger and  
ticket agent, who makes the appoint-  
ment, says that Mr. Knowles has been  
very highly recommended and he be-  
lieves that he will prove a valuable  
acquisition to the Central-East and  
West lines in Houston.

During the eight years' service of  
Mr. Knowles with the Missouri, Kan-  
sas and Texas, he served first as as-  
sistant city passenger and ticket  
agent in St. Louis. He was then trav-  
eling passenger agent in Oklahoma  
City. He has been out of the service  
of the Katy system since last March.  
Mr. Knowles will arrive in Houston  
this morning and immediately assume  
his new duties in the local city ticket  
office of the Central-East and West  
lines.

## TO THE FARMERS

And Cotton Raisers of Anderson, Cher-  
okee, Leon, Freestone and Hous-  
ton Counties.

The Board of Trade of Palestine offers  
the following named premiums for  
the first three bales of cotton of  
this year's growth brought to this city  
for sale: For the first bale a cash  
premium of \$25.00; for the second  
bale a cash premium of \$15.00; for the  
third bale a cash premium of \$10.00,  
on the following conditions:

First. The cotton must be brought  
to Palestine and placed in front of the  
Board of Trade rooms for the inspection  
of the committee appointed by the  
Board.

Second. The bales must weigh not  
less than 450 pounds each.

Third. The bales must not contain  
any other but such cotton as is  
grown in 1906.
