MORE LIKE BUSINESS

Surveyors Are in the Field, and Railway Promoters Are Active—Mr. Crennan Talks of Road.

A Herald man had the pleasure today of meeting Mr. J. M. Crennan, who is designated as the general land commissioner of the Union Central Railway company. The gentleman in a brief conversation stated that the railroad proposition was a go, and that it all depended on how Palestine took hold of the matter as to whether or not the road will make this town. He says they want to make Palestine, and would do so, if Palestine will only come across with the bonus asked for.

Mr. Crennan asked what was the matter with the Herald and the Union Central, anyway, to which the Herald man replied: "Nothing, absolutely nothing. The quarrel the Herald has made with Mr. Hogue was not directed against the Union Central railroad, but against the very questionable methods employed by the Union Central Construction company in handling its land scheme." DEAD IN THE ROAD.

Twelve Corpses Found and Fifteen Injured Tornado Victims.

Hattiesburg, Miss., April 27.—Belated reports from the territory along the logging road of J. F. Wilder, running west from Epps station, indicate that the loss of life in that section as the result of Friday's tornado is much larger than at first reported. At a turpentine camp between Epps and Purvis near the road twelve dead were found and fifteen injured. The dead are:

Mrs. Robinson and child.

Mrs. James Ford and child.

Unknown white man.

Chalmers Poole and child.

Five members of a negro family.

All of the injured are negroes, and it will be necessary to care for them at once where they were found, as a majority of them are in such condition that they could not stand the twelve-mile trip by wagon over the rough roads.

In the same vicinity Mrs. Maggie Nicholas, Mrs. M. T. Buckley and Mrs. Annie Cunningham, three white women, were seriously injured by falling timbers.

Eight white persons were injured at Lowes Hill. It is impossible to reach this point in vehicles because of the impassable condition of the roads. Relief has been sent there from Lumberton.

DIED FROM INJURIES.

Three More Deaths of Tornado Victims in Natchez Hospital.

Natchez, Miss., April 27.—Three deaths today at the Natchez Charity Hospital make a total of 110 for the territory embraced in the tornado's path from Black River, La., through Concordia Parish, La., and the counties of Adams and Jefferson in this state and Melton Station in Claiborne county.

Relief work has been inaugurated, but the demand far exceeds the supply. One hundred and fifty families are in need of tents in Adams and Jefferson counties. It will be impossible to rebuild the cabins until the roads

have been cleared.
