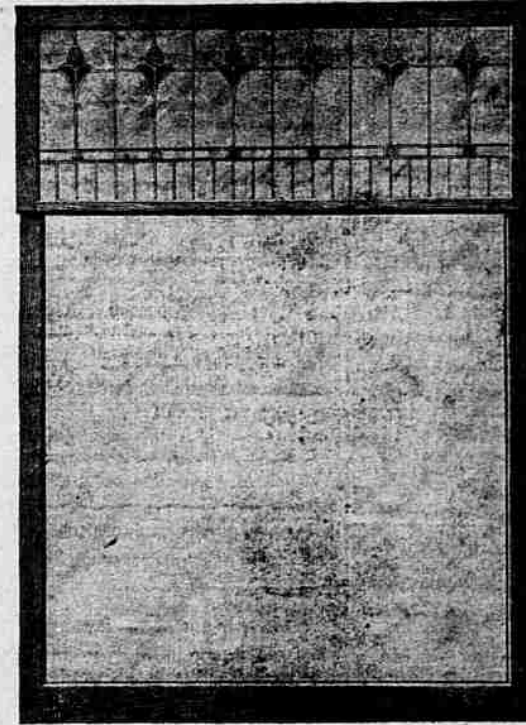

Weather Conditions.

The storm on the North Carolina coast yesterday is now over New England, attended by heavy rain. Rain fell Thursday on the coast from North Carolina to Boston. The high pressure which was central yesterday over North Dakota has increased in area and now covers the Northwestern states and upper valleys, attended by a temperature of 26 degrees above zero. The freezing line is as far south as Northern Kansas. At 7 a. m. the temperature ranged from 36 in the Panhandle to 58 degrees at Corpus Christi. It is as warm in the Middle Atlantic states as on the Texas coast. Frost is reported this morning in all the cotton belt. The storm noted yesterday on the Oregon coast is causing rain and warmer weather in that section.
