

Road Overseer W. P. Taylor of Neches Says Palestine Streets Badly Need the Treatment.

Road Overseer W. P. Taylor of Neches was here today, and he said he had seen South Sycamore street, and the remedy he would prescribe for a street in that condition is the split log drag. They have a drag at Neches, he said, and it is owned by Mr. L. C. Curtis. Mr. Curtis is a gentleman who recently located at Neches, hailing from Indiana. He is in the mill business and also is interested in farming matters. At Attica, Ind., the Curtises own a big steel bridge building plant, of which Mr. Curtis is the head. He spends his winters south, at Neches, and his summers north. But getting back to the drag: Mr. Curtis had built at his mill a drag along the lines of the split log drag, but it is made of steel,

### DECLARED NOT GUILTY.

Jury In Mrs. Fay Hurd Jones Case Out Five Minutes.

San Antonio, Texas, Feb. 10.—The jury today rendered a verdict of not guilty in the case of Fay Hurd Jones, charged with the murder of her husband, Nat B. Jones, Nov. 12, 1909. The twelve men deliberated on the case less than five minutes.

Shortly before noon, at the conclusion of the argument of Assistant District Attorney Chambers, Mrs. Jones collapsed and court had to adjourn. Physicians worked over her for three hours, but she was still unconscious when court met in the afternoon. She was brought into the court room on a cot and remained in a comatose condition all during the afternoon. Even when the verdict was announced she could not be roused enough to realize that she was a free woman. She was taken from the room on a cot and conveyed to her home in an ambulance.

Jones was shot three times on the night on November 12 in the room of Mrs. Jones at the Ludlow Hotel, in this city. An automatic pistol was used. Mrs. Jones admitted the shooting, but claimed that her husband was advancing on her with a razor. She

said she shot in self-defense. The jury in its verdict agreed with her contention.
