LARGEST ORCHARD

In Existence Is Now Being Planted In La Salle County.

San Antonio, Texas, Feb. 15.—What is claimed to be the largest orchard ever planted in one continuous tract is now being laid out in La Salle county, some forty miles south of this city. The property to be converted to this use is now wild prairie land and comprises 4,600 acres or a little over seven square miles. Among the fruits to be raised are apples, pears, peaches, oranges, limes, lemons and figs. Of the latter nearly a thousand acres will be set out, the fruit having been shown to be a tremendous success in these parts. About six hundred acres of the land will be used for the raising of berries and vegetables.

The tract is owned and will be operated by the Altito Orchard and Preserving company, recently chartered in Austin. A large cannery will be erected on the land within a few months. To make the land profitable while the trees are reaching maturity sugar cane and vegetables will be grown. A contract for the installation of the Wiggins system of sub-irrigation, which is to cover the entire tract, has already been let and a survey of a railroad connecting with the International & Great Northern at Cotulla has been made.

HE WANTS RE-ELECTION

Boom For Senator Chauncey M. Depew of New York Will Be Launched Thursday Night.

Albany, N. Y., Feb. 16.—It is expected that Senator Chauncey M. Depew's boom for re-election will be formally launched here tomorrow night, when the senator will be the chief speaker at the annual dinner of the Albany County Republican Organization. Senator Depew recently concluded that he wanted to return to the senate, while the republican party in this state has not yet decided whether it will permit him to do so. The prospects for his success, however, appear somewhat brighter than they did a while back. Timothy L. Woodruff, who has had senatorial aspirations for a long time, has announced that he will keep out of Depew's way and has accepted an invitation to speak in the senator's behalf at the dinner tomorrow night. Representative J. Sloat Fassett, another man who has been willing to go to the senate for a long time, has also assured Senator Depew that he will keep out of the race. Senator Depew and his friends could plan more accurately if they knew what Colonel Roosevelt intends to do when he gets back from Africa. Some of the former president's friends here are quite certain he will desire to go to the senate. While the republicans are trying to decide whether they shall retain the services of Mr. Depew, the democrats are expressing the hope of being able to capture the legislature and elect a democratic senator.
