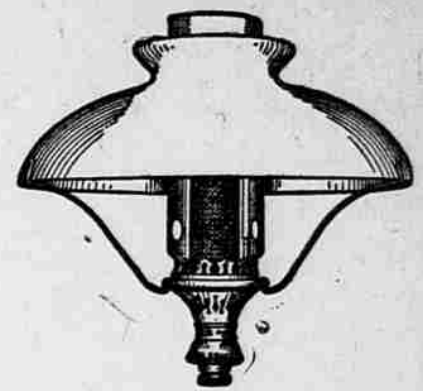

### LABOR COMMISSIONER

Joseph S. Myers is here on an inspection trip, looking into the State Labor Laws.

State Labor Commissioner Joseph S. Myers arrived in the city this morning, on a regular official tour of the state, looking into labor conditions and seeing if the new state laws are being observed. Mr. Myers at this particular time is giving special attention to the observance of the ash pan and car shed laws, and in some places visited has found that the laws are being ignored. He will inspect the plants here and make a note of conditions as he finds them. While here Mr. Myers has been shown attention by Attorney J. J. Strickland, a former Austin acquaintance. He will leave for other points tonight.

### EXAMINING PALESTINE

Fire Rating Board Has Representatives Here to Determine on Insurance Rates For City.

Messrs. George G. Jones and Lyman Hanes, representing the Texas State Fire Rating Board, are in the city, making an inspection of each business building, determining the efficiency of the fire-fighting apparatus, etc., etc., with a view to fixing the insurance rate for the city. These gentlemen will make a careful inspection of each building, and examine the exposures, determine the liability of fires, the dangers, risks, etc., and the rate will be fixed when all these are taken into account.

This work is being done for all the towns of the state. In some the rate is being on an average lowered; in others, the rate is being increased. In the latter places a howl is being heard—Fort Worth, for instance, where mass meetings have been held, resolutions passed, etc., demanding a better rating.

Palestine ought to stand the test, and get a comparatively low rate, because her business houses are mostly substantial, properly wired in most cases, and the local fire department has proven itself capable of taking care of most fires that come its way.

### ANOTHER OF THEM DEAD

John F. Scott Sixth of Those Connected With Graft Cases in Pennsylvania to Die.

(Herald Special.) Harrisburg, Pa., Feb. 16.—John F. Scott, one of the most important witnesses in the recent Pennsylvania capitol graft trials, was found dead in bed at his home early today. Scott was secretary of the grounds and buildings committee during the con-

struction of the capitol. He died at the home of D. Armspriester, where he boarded. The physician pronounced his death due to apoplexy. This is the sixth death of persons connected with the famous graft cases.

**French Company Massacred.** Paris, Feb. 15.—A whole company, consisting of five French officers and 110 native soldiers, has been massacred, according to advices from the French headquarters at Dakar.
