HUNDREDS ARE MISSING

Worst Storm of Years Swept Japanese Coast—Hun- dred Vessels Reported Scattered Out to Sea.

(Herald Special.)
Tokio, March 14.—Several hundred
fishermen are missing today as the
result of the worst storm to sweep
the Japanese coast since 1880. It is
estimated that more than one hun-

dred vessels, large and small, have
been swept away and scattered along
the coast or driven to sea. Other ves-
sels have been sent out on rescue
work, but beyond question many peo-
ple have lost their lives.

THE ROOSEVELTS ARRIVE ANOTHER TRAIN BURIED

At Khartoum, and Are Given Rousing
Welcome—Police Body Guard
Provided For Party.

(Herald Special.)
Khartoum, March 14.—Colonel Theo-
dore Roosevelt and son Kermit arrived
at "Gordon's Tree," a scene made
memorable by the English general,
this afternoon. This is a few miles
from Khartoum proper, and the
Roosevelt party will not enter the city
until later in the day. Hundreds of
letters and telegrams were delivered
to the Roosevelts here. The Roose-
velts will stay at the home of Sirdar
Wingate until the Colonel goes to the
station to meet his wife, which meet-
ing will be private and without any
escort or formality. Captain Clayton
has already gone to Gordon's Tree to
meet the party and extend an official
welcome to the city, and a police
body guard has also been provided.

Later.—Roosevelt made his trium-
phant entry into Khartoum this after-
noon. There was no official display,
but great crowds lined the wharf and
cheered as the steamer Dal passed.
Roosevelt was dressed in a khaki
hunting suit and wore a slouch hat.
He went at once to the palace, where
a private dinner was held. Roosevelt
was escorted between a line of armed
guards. After dinner he took leave
of the negroes who had been com-
panions in the hunt. Each was reward-
ed with a gift. Arrangements have
been made for the famous hunter to
meet his wife and daughter.

WANT CASE POSTPONED

Defense In the Saylor Murder Case
Will Ask For Postponement
of the Trial.

(Herald Special.)
Watska, Ill., March 11.—The hear-
ing in the Saylor case was postponed
from this morning until this after-
noon, when it is understood the de-
fense will ask for a postponement of
the trial. The plea for a postpone-
ment will be based on the fact that a
brother-in-law of Mrs. Saylor, an im-
portant witness, is absent in Califor-
nia. Feeling is running very high
here, and a special number of depu-
ties have been stationed about the
court room to prevent any kind of an
outburst. It is feared by the court
officials that violence may be at-
tempted on the prisoners.

KENYON GETS GOOD JOB

President Selects Fort Dodge Man to
Be Assistant Attorney General,
Vice Wade Ellis.

Washington, D. C., March 14.—The
department of justice today an-
nounced the selection by the presi-
dent of Wm. S. Kenyon of Fort Dodge,
Iowa, as assistant attorney general,
succeeding Wade Ellis of Ohio. The
president sent the nomination to the
senate this afternoon.

ANOTHER STRIKE FAILED.

Philadelphia Grocery Clerks Are at
Work, Refusing to Go Out.

Philadelphia, Pa., March 14.—The
general strike of grocery clerks and
others, calculated to cause a food
shortage in the city, proposed by the
strikers yesterday, proved unsuccess-
ful, as most of such employes are
working today as usual. The situa-
tion is otherwise very quiet at this
time.

ANOTHER TRAIN BURIED

By Snowslide at Wellington, Wash-
ington—Laborer Is Missing and
Engineer Injured.

St. Paul, Minn., March 14.—The
Great Northern railroad offices here
have received a report of a second
snowslide which occurred near Wel-
lington, Washington, early Sunday
morning. The slide buried a big ro-
tary snow plow and seriously injured
John Annen, engineer of the loco-
motive attached. An Italian laborer is
also reported missing and it is be-
lieved he is buried under the snow
and ice. The snow blocked the road
for several hours, but it is said the
road will be open to traffic today.

TROUBLE IN THESSALY

Christian Peasants Attack Land Own-
ers, Sacking and Burning Homes.
Troops Feared.

Athens, March 14.—Violent demon-
strations are reported throughout
Thessaly today as a result of the
government refusing to grant the de-
mands of the christian peasants to
bid the land owners, Turks and Mo-
hammedans, to divide their lands.

ARGUMENTS BEGIN.

(Herald Special.)
Washington, D. C., March
14.—Arguments in the Stand-
ard Oil case will begin before
the supreme court late this af-
ternoon.
Attorney Milburn of the
Standard counsel opened the
argument in the case.

The peasants attacked the land own-
ers, killing some owners and sacking
and burning the homes. The land
owners have turned their homes into
fortresses, and are resisting the at-
tacks. It is feared the troops will
aid the peasants.

DEMANDS BOOKS.

National Packing Company Must Pro-
duce Records in Court.

Trenton, N. J., March 14.—Judge
Swayzee in an opinion today directs
the National Packing company to
bring before him all books filed for
inspection by Prosecutor Garvin.
Garvin claims that the books will
show that the prices of food products
have been unnecessarily increased by
the combination of the packers.

HEIKE GETS HEARING.

Supreme Court Denied the Motion of
Government.

(Herald Special.)
Washington, D. C., March 14.—The
supreme court of the United States
today denied the motion of the gov-
ernment to set aside the order of
Justice Lurton bringing the case of
Chas. R. Heike before that body, and
granted permission to Heike's attor-
neys to file a petition for a writ of
mandamus. Heike was a former sec-
retary of the sugar trust and was in-
dicted in connection with the cus-
toms weighing frauds.
