### MAY CHANGE SCHEDULE.

I. & G. N. Officials Visit Tyler For Conference With Fruit Men.

Several officials of the I. & G. N. railway are in the city today consulting with local fruit men, together with Traffic Agent C. E. Wood, with reference to changing the schedule of the fruit train which now leaves the city about half past eight.

It is urged that it is impossible to get the fruit and tomato cars ready and sealed by that time, on account of the farmers not being able to get their stuff to the shed before late in the afternoon, and hence it cannot be loaded in so short a time. It is desired that the special fruit train leave Tyler between 10 and 11 o'clock. Cotton Belt trains leave about this time, and it is impossible to get the stuff loaded earlier.

The officials in Tyler today are: H. Martin, general superintendent; N. M. Leach, general freight agent; T. C. Radey, division superintendent. The party is traveling in Mr. Martin's special car, and will return to Palestine this afternoon.

It is likely that the schedule will be changed to suit the convenience of the fruit men.—Tyler Courier-Times.

Only Thing That Stands Between Palestine and Big Union Revival Is the Necessary Funds.

The following are some extracts from a very favorable letter written by Dr. R. A. Torrey, evangelist, in answer to an inquiry from our local ministers as to the possibility of engaging him for a union meeting here in October.

He says: "I would entertain an invitation from that city, but could not promise now that I would accept it. There are two or three other places with which I am in correspondence about the month of October, but I think I would go to Palestine rather than these other places if everything was satisfactory.

"I set no price on my services. Committees pay me what they choose. I seldom know until the close of the meeting what they are going to pay me. It varies more or less. Usually it is raised by a free will offering taken on the last two Sundays and the nights intervening. I am not after the money and I have never had any occasion to complain at the amounts paid me.

"I do not permit a public collection to be taken either for me or the work.

"If you decided to call me you should secure a guarantee fund before the meetings began. Part of this should be paid in. The tabernacle should be paid for at all events. Of course, the collections will cover a large share of the expenses, but in very few places have they covered all and it is not safe to depend upon it.

It is a great deal easier and more satisfactory in every way to go around and get everybody possible to contribute toward the work. A great many will be willing to subscribe \$1 or \$10, and even more. It is a good thing to get the money from as many people as possible. Of course, I do not mean the money for me. That has very seldom, if ever, been subscribed beforehand, and I have no desire that it should be; and if it was, I would not want to know it.

"The helpers that are with me, I do not ask that the churches guarantee to pay, though they always have done it. I guarantee to pay them.

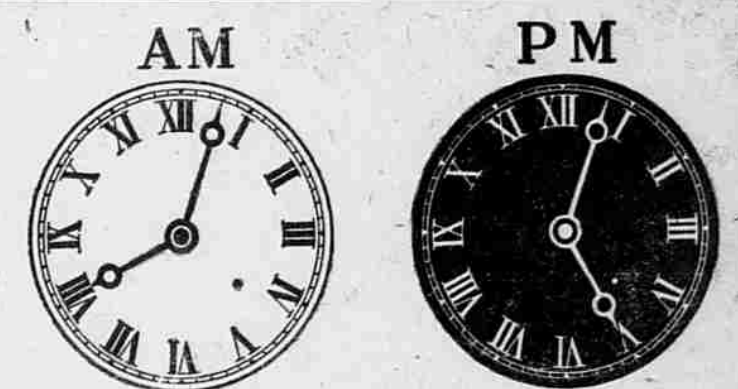
"Possibly if we could not go in October we might go some other month."
