ELEVEN MEN KILLED.

Explosion Resulted on Transcontinental Railroad in Quebec Today.

Quebec, July 27.—Eleven men were killed by an explosion on the Transcontinental Railroad twenty-five miles east of Latta, Quebec, today. The men were engaged in blasting near a tunnel on the railroad. A number of other workmen were injured.

A GENERAL STRIKE ON

OF ALL BUILDING TRADE WORKERS IN CHICAGO—EIGHTEEN THOUSAND MEN AFFECTED BY THE STRIKE CALL.

Chicago, Ill., July 27.—A general strike of all building trade workers was ordered today, to take immediate effect. The trouble arose over disagreement in the construction of a building for the Otis Elevator company here. Between fifteen and eighteen thousand men are affected by the strike order.

POLICE ARE PERPLEXED

Scotland Yard Trying to Get In Touch With the Steamer Montrose and Locate Doctor Crippen.

Montreal, Canada, July 27.—The Canadian police have requested the wireless operators at Bell Isle, on the Labrador coast, to make every effort to pick up the steamer Montrose by wireless and ascertain definitely if the Rev. John Robinson and son, who boarded the Montrose at Antwerp are really Dr. H. R. Crippen and Miss Leneve. The latest dispatches from Scotland Yard admit that the police are not sure the couple on the Montrose are not the parties wanted. The Canadian police are also perplexed, and want to get in touch with the steamer to help unravel the problem they are facing.

Killed With Shotgun.

Atlanta, Texas, July 26.—Allen Perdue, aged 18 years, of this city, accidentally killed himself this afternoon about 6 o'clock with a Winchester pump shotgun. While playing with the gun, not knowing that it was loaded, it went off, the charge of the same penetrating his neck, killing him instantly.

REGULARS WON OUT

GARFIELD AND HIS SUPPORTERS LOST THEIR FIGHT IN OHIO, AND STANDPATTERS ADOPT A VERY STRONG PLATFORM.

HARDING NOMINATED.

Columbus, Ohio, July 27.—(Flash from convention hall.)—Warren G. Harding was nominated for governor on the third ballot. The vote was: Harding, 746; Brown, 120; Longworth, 195; Garfield, 5. Lieutenant Governor Treadway was renominated by acclamation.

Columbus, Ohio, July 27.—The governorship nomination was anybody's fight up to the last minute before the opening of the republican state convention. The convention hall is jammed today with interested spectators and supporters of the various candidates. All of the big party leaders of the state seem to be in a befuddled state of mind, and this is the first time in many years when the machine has not come into the convention with a slate all made and agreed upon. The candidates, Judge O. B. Brown, Camil Thompson and Warren

Harding, all express confidence of James R. Garfield refuses his candidacy ahead of the for a progressive platform, and refuses to make any predictions as to his nomination. Walter F. Brown of Toledo was re-elected chairman of the central committee last night.

This morning it appeared that the bosses would combine on a platform with the view of forcing Garfield to withdraw his name from the convention. Indications are also that Dick has withdrawn his support from Thompson to aid Cox's candidate, Judge Brown. Garfield's leaders were unable to find Congressman Paul Howland this morning, and unless he makes a minority report there is no chance of a fight on the convention floor. The committee on resolutions includes nine congressmen, one congressional nominee and one United States senator.

Garfield Withdraws Name.

Columbus, Ohio, July 27.—Garfield this morning dropped his fight against an endorsement of the Payne-Aldrich tariff bill, against the Taft administration, and at the same time announced the withdrawal of his name from before the convention as a candidate for governor. Senator Dick then presented the strongest standpat platform an Ohio convention has ever seen. The failure of Garfield's leading supporters to stand by him in his fight caused him to withdraw and give the standpat full right of way. He was outgeneraled by the regulars. The platform agreed on by the resolutions committee indorses the tariff bill, Taft's new tariff commission, favors a ship subsidy, indorses conservation and further amendments to the anti-trust laws. The platform as submitted was adopted without protest.

FOUR CAMPAIGN ISSUES

Roosevelt Editorial Says People Are Confronted By Same Questions as Heretofore.

New York, July 27.—"There are four issues before the American people this year, namely, the direct primaries, the congressional organization, railway regulation and conservation, and they are all one and the same, the perpetually stirring issues between an oligarchy and democracy." The Outlook thus sums up the coming campaign in the current number in an unsigned editorial by Roosevelt. The editorial is not his style, but it is believed that he was consulted in its preparation.

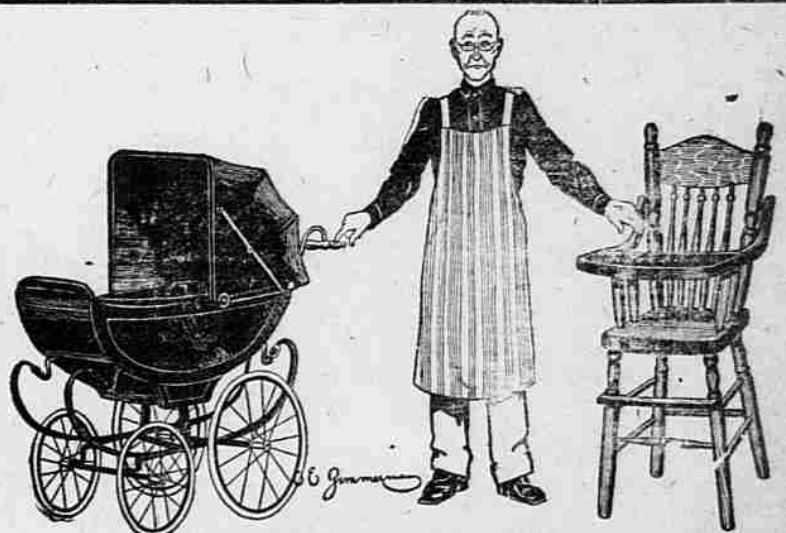
