The weather station there forecasts a further fall tonight. A temperature of 52 degrees, with light snow, is reported at Canadian, also in the Panhandle.

TWO KILLED IN AUTO WRECK.

Frank Grice of San Antonio and Jim Phelps of Kaufman the Victims.

Forney, Texas, Aug. 25.—American roadster automobile No. 433 of San Antonio was wrecked on the high dump in the river bottom three miles west of here about 6 o'clock this afternoon, and Frank Grice of San Antonio, who was driving the car, and who was visiting in Kaufman, and Jim Phelps, agent for the Wells-Fargo Express company at Kaufman, were instantly killed. Trave Carlisle of Kaufman, who was also in the car, escaped with minor injuries. He was sitting on the rear seat. Both of the dead men were married. Grice is a son-in-law of M. O. Spikes of Kaufman and Phelps is related to R. O. Anthony, former deputy sheriff.

The accident occurred at a very dangerous place in the river bottom, and the car was being driven at a high rate of speed, persons who saw it just before the accident stating they were racing with the Willis Point

local passenger, which was passing at that time.

The dead bodies were viewed by Squire T. M. Daniels, whose verdict was according to the above facts. The bodies were brought here and prepared for burial by the local undertaker. The machine was slightly damaged.

The embankment was eighteen or twenty feet high where they ran off. The car turned completely over, and was on top of the men when assistance arrived.
