Democratic Executive Committee Deplures Death of Senator Stokes.

Lufkin, Texas, Aug. 18, 1910. Hon. I. A. Daniels, Chairman of the Thirteenth Senatorial District of Texas:

We, your committee, appointed by your honorable body to draft suitable resolutions on the death of the late lamented C. C. Stokes, senator from this district, who departed this life on the 12th day of August, 1910, beg leave to submit the following report:

Whereas, it has pleased Almighty God to take from the field of active labor Hon. C. C. Stokes, lately state senator from this, the Thirteenth senatorial district of Texas, in the prime of his usefulness and vigor; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, By the democratic executive committee of this, the Thirteenth senatorial district of Texas, in call session, at Lufkin, Texas, this the 18th day of August, 1910: That for the past six years Senator Stokes has served this district with patriotic, unswerving and self-sacrificing devotion and with rare skill and ability. That in his death the state of Texas has lost a distinguished citizen, and the democratic party a wise counsellor and brilliant leader. That in private and in public life he was faithful to every trust, a devoted and loving husband, a true and upright man, an able lawyer and jurist.

The disturbance that was over the New England states has passed out to sea, attended by rain along the North Atlantic coast. The barometer is relatively low over the South Atlantic states and rain has occurred in that section. A storm of considerable intensity overlies the Rocky mountain region and the northern Plains states. Showers are reported in Louisiana, Tennessee and Utah. There has been a marked change to warmer weather in the Rocky mountain district, while in the North Atlantic states it is much cooler. The weather is generally clear and slightly cooler in Texas this morning. Increased cloudiness is indicated for this vicinity tonight and Sunday.

BIG RALLY IS PLANNED

FOR LABOR DAY NIGHT TO BOOST PARK ELECTION—BOARD OF TRADE AND LABOR COUNCIL WORKING IN HARMONY.

The Board of Trade committee, composed of Messrs. Jno. R. Hearne, G. H. Turner, J. W. Ozmment, D. M. Hodges and H. V. Hamilton, appointed to arrange for a mass meeting and rally to boost the park election, met last night and discussed the plans very fully. The only interest members of the committee have in the matter is to see the city get the parks offered. And the subject was discussed from this viewpoint. Mr. Hearne was chairman of the committee, and invited an exchange of ideas as to a program, etc. After a very full discussion it was decided to hold the rally on Labor Day night, and make the event in the nature of a mass meeting with speaking by a number of men, including professional, business and laboring men. The committee is busy today securing speakers and making other arrangements, and will be ready to make definite announcements by Monday. It is known now that President R. A. Garner of the Trades and Labor Council and Mr. Jno. R. Hearne of the Board of Trade will be among the speakers.

The rally will be held on Oak street, in front of the Gas office. At the time the Board of Trade committee was in session the Trades and Labor Council was also in session, and fully endorsed the park proposition, and selected a committee of five, composed of Messrs. A. M. Cohen, C. O. Miller, Dick Guinn, W. B. Riley and R. A. Garner, to act with the Board of Trade committee. Members of the two committees got together later in the evening and consolidated interests. Full plans will be published not later than Monday, and efforts will be made to have a great rally on the night above suggested.
