WAS BLOOD THIRSTY INVASION HAS BEGUN

MILWAUKEE MAN WENT ON WARPATH DETERMINED TO EXTERMINATE HIS ENTIRE FAMILY. NOW IN PRISON.

Milwaukee, Wis., Nov. 4.—In an apparent effort to rid himself of his entire family, Louis Hoffman, at Cedarburg today, shot and killed his twelve-year-old son, and wounded his wife and a brother and nephew. He then surrendered to the officers.

RUMORED KING IS DEAD

A Report Not Credited Says King Alfonso of Spain Is Victim of Assassin.

London, Nov. 4.—The Star today publishes a rumor that King Alfonso of Spain has been assassinated. However, little credence is given the report, though it has not been denied.

ANARCHY IS SPREADING.

Armed Bodies Organizing Throughout Honduras—Bonilla Active.

San Salvador, Nov. 4.—Armed bodies are organizing throughout Honduras today, and the spirit of anarchy is spreading. President Bonilla intends capturing the presidency again.

Warrants Issued.

Spears, Wyo., Nov. 4.—Warrants have been issued for the arrest of the six men indicted yesterday on charges that they entered into an agreement with claimants of coal lands in Alaska whereby they would secure a half interest in claims that would give them more coal lands than the law allows. The lands involved are estimated at a value of two hundred million dollars, including one hundred and thirty-one claims of one hundred and sixty acres each.

Bryan Will Speak.

Smithville, Texas, Nov. 2.—William J. Bryan, the great commoner, will speak in Smithville on Monday night, November 21, under the auspices of the Smithville Ten Thousand Club.

NO FAULT OF WATER CO.

Mr. Williams Says Pressure Was Given as Soon as the Alarm Reached Them.

Mr. Chas. Williams of the Palestine Water company says the company was in no wise to blame for the delay in getting water pressure at the Crawford home fire, but that the fault was in the tardy sending in of the alarm. He says the fire company was on the ground, with hose laid and trying to use water from domestic pressure before the company was notified fire pressure was needed. In proof of the prompt response Mr. Williams showed the register chart, showing that the pressure jumped from sixty pounds to ninety-eight pounds at 2.28, the time the alarm was received. And the chart shows the pressure was not more than a minute in coming up. As to the damaged fire hydrant, Mr. Williams said the paving contractors damaged this hydrant, and that the water company notified the city at the time, and as it was the duty of the city or the contractors to repair the damage it was put up to them to make the repair.

HUNDRED ENTOMBED.

Five Persons Killed in Mine Explosion in Alabama.

Birmingham, Ala., Nov. 4.—In an explosion today fully one hundred men were entombed in a mine at Yolande, near here. Five persons are known to have been killed.

THE BRITISH INVASION OF PERSIA BEGINS WITH A PITCHED BATTLE — TROUBLE BREWING IN THE OLD WORLD.

Teheran, Persia, Nov. 4.—The British invasion of Persia has begun, with a pitched battle in which it is reported a commander and several sailors of a British cruiser were wounded. Serious trouble, even to the point of involving Russia, France and Germany, is expected to follow. The Persians, believing the British invasion is a scheme to divide the kingdom with Russia, have declared they will fight to the end.

Germany, Austria and France opposition to the acts of England is known, and Russia may enter a formal protest. The big nations want Persia, Russia, without a seaport free from ice, has been planning and turning toward Persia, and has established schools, banks, railroads and churches. England has landed marines and threatens to restore peace and charge an indemnity against Persia, which the latter will be unable to pay, and thus be forced to agree to annexation. Russia and England are working in perfect accord. The other nations are opposed to giving Russia an open port, enabling that country to become a standing menace to their peace.

Radicals Are Disgusted.

Barcelona, Spain, Nov. 4.—Spanish radicals are disgusted over the statement of the republican leader, Alexander Lerreaux, that Spain will be a republic within three years. The radicals answer this by declaring that it will be a republic within three weeks. Popular discontent is rapidly increasing.

BURNED AT THE STAKE.

Rock Springs Citizens Avenge Death of Mrs. Henderson.

Rock Springs, Texas, Nov. 4.—Antonio Rodriguez, the Mexican who confessed to murdering Mrs. Lem Henderson here, was taken from jail and burned at the stake at a late hour last night. The Mexican rode up to the woman's home, and as she sat on her gallery shot her dead. He then rode away. Later he was captured and made a confession.

LOCAL

The union revival closes tonight. City commissioners close contract with St. Louis firms for purchase of auto fire-fighting machine and chemical engine at cost of \$12,000.

STORM IS RAGING
