### Grand Central's Plant.

The Salt Lake Herald of Sunday gives the following description of the magnificent new hoisting plant on the Grand Central mine at Mammoth. As Provo people are the owners of the control of this property, the description will doubtless be of interest to our readers:

The principal surface equipment consists of the boiler room, engine room, shaft house and blacksmith shop, all commodious and particularly built with a view of convenience. All of the buildings are connected and built of structural steel. The inside of the engine room is lined first with asbestos paper attached to wire netting, then covered with corrugated iron, composing a double thickness of iron on the sides, practically rendering the premises fireproof.

The gallow frame, which is fifty feet in center of sheaves, is also built of structural steel, and rests on piers of solid masonry. The building and gallow frame were designed and erected by representatives of the Gillette-Herzog company of Minneapolis.

The boiler house is equipped with two 72x16 feet boilers of the horizontal tubular type, full front, one tubular feed water heater and one Knowles boiler feed pump. The power house contains a double 18x48 first motion flat rope hoisting engine, equipped with the most approved steam brakes. Lane's steam clutch and steam reverse gear. The rope reels have a capacity of 2200 feet of flat wire rope. The engine, being guaranteed to perform all work required to a depth of 2000 feet was built by the Webster, Camp & Lane company of Akron, O.

In close proximity to the hoisting plant is the half duplex Corliss engine air compressor, built by the Ingersoll-Sargent Rock Drill company, the air cylinder of which is 18x42, and the steam cylinder 16x42. The balance wheel is 16 feet in diameter, with a 37-foot force. The compressor is rated with a capacity of supplying from eight to ten air drills.

The engine room is partitioned from the shaft room, but large windows enable the engineer to obtain a full view of the top of the shaft. The carpenter shop is a large lumber structure, 30x98 feet, and is fully equipped with timber framing machines, swing cut off and wedge saws. A car track runs from the timber yard into and through the entire building. All of the buildings will be heated by steam, the exhaust being utilized for that purpose. An electric light system will be used for lighting the surface premises, as well as underground stations. Electric signals will also be employed, enabling a man to make known the station or level desired, even between levels, by means of a button system, which produces and extinguishes lights at will.

A very complete assay office is conducted under the management. The pumping plant now being installed at Robinson will supply the mine with water, and when all of the new plans are doing their respective duties, attention will be directed towards building the wire rope tramway, which will convey the ore from the mine to the railway.
