UNCLE SAM'S NEUTRALITY.

President Declares Our Position in The War.

The following is a part of President Roosevelt's proclamation declaring the neutrality of the United States in the Russo-Japanese war:

"And I do hereby enjoin all the good citizens of the United States and all persons residing or being within the territory of jurisdiction of the United States to observe the laws thereof and to commit no action contrary to the provisions of said statutes or in violation of the law of nations in that behalf.

"And I do hereby warn all citizens of the United States and all persons residing or being within their territory or jurisdiction that while the free and full expression of sympathy in public or private is not restricted by the laws of the United States, military forces in aid of either belligerent can not lawfully be originated or organized within their jurisdiction, and that while all persons may lawfully and without restriction by reason of the aforesaid state of war manufacture and sell within the United States arms and munitions of war and other articles ordinarily known as contraband of war, yet they can not carry such articles upon the high seas for the use or service of either belligerent, nor can they transport soldiers and officers of either, or attempt to break any blockade which may be lawfully established and maintained during the war, without incurring the risk of hostile capture and the penalties denounced by the law of nations in that behalf. And I do hereby give notice that all citizens of the United States and others who may claim the protection of this government who may conduct themselves from the premises will do so at their peril, and that they can in no wise obtain any protection from the government of the United States against the consequences of their conduct. THEODORE ROOSEVELT.

RUSSIA IN BAD WAY.

Fleet Bottled Up and No Chance to Combine.

Russia's navy is widely scattered. A large part of it is in the Baltic set, in northern Europe; and a strong fleet is in the Black sea, in southern Europe, where it is effectually bottled up by the treaty of 1841, confirmed by the Paris peace of 1856.

The Bosphorus connects the Black sea with the sea of Marmora, and the Dardanelles connects the sea of Marmora with the Mediterranean. By the terms of the treaty of 1841 no foreign ship of war may enter the Dardanelles except by Turkish permission. Therefore the Russian Black sea fleet can not pass into the Mediterranean and thence into the Atlantic.

Now that the Russian squadron in the Pacific has been crippled by the Japanese, Russia must find a way to strengthen the damaged squadron or yield naval supremacy to the government of the mikado. It is not surprising, therefore, to learn that a report is current in London that Russia is trying to arrange with Turkey to permit the Black sea fleet to pass the Dardanelles. Since the consent of Great Britain will also be needed, there is no probability that the Russian fleet will be released. Japan and Great Britain are bound by treaty to support each other under certain contingencies. This alliance is particularly directed against Russia, and Great Britain will not consent to the liberation of a hostile fleet which would instantly be directed against her friend and ally.

R. G. Dun & Co.'s Weekly Review of Trade says: War, fire and cotton were the adverse factors in the week in the country and the country stood the shock remarkably well, and there are numerous encouraging symptoms. To a large extent the outbreak of hostilities in the orient and the collapse of the cotton boom had been discounted and the disastrous loss of the Baltimore conflagration was offset very largely by the stimulus it will give to many distributing industries.

In restoring Baltimore there will be great activity in the building trades, while large stocks of goods must be replaced and orders filled by jobbers and manufacturers elsewhere.

More or less traffic congestion results from the weather, and this factor accounts for the small loss of 1.7 per cent in railway earnings during January.


Cruiser Askold Sinks.
