SPOKANE FIRM GETS SOUTH FORK JOB

Contract Awarded to Otto Hanson at \$2000 Above Appropriation.

At acontract price of \$187,000 the construction of the first link of the South Fork project was awarded to Otto Hanson, a Spokane contractor, last Saturday, by the U. S. bureau of public roads, the bid being \$2000 in excess of the federal apprepriation. the Grangeville Highway district cooperating to the extent of \$50,000.

Construction will be commenced within a short time and the contract calls for the completion of the work within 250 working days. U. S. Engineer, F. H. Cotter of Missoula, is in the city and will establish permanent headquarters in this city and have general supervision of the work.

The contract covers a distance of approximately eleven miles, from a connection a few miles east of this city at Rocky, Point to Meadow creek, near the Castle Creek ranger station.
