Germany has virtually surrendered. The armistice, providing for the ces-sation of hostilities, was signed by German representatives in France, Monday morning at 5 o'clock, Paris time. Hostilities ceased the same morning at 11 o'clock, Paris time, or 3 o'clock Pacific-

Signing of the armistice was proclaimed Monday by President Wilson, who also announced its terms at a joint session of congress.

5. Evacuation by the German armies of the countries on the left bank of the Rhine. These countries on the left bank of the Rhine shall be administered by the local authorities under the control of the allied and United States armies of occupation.

The occupation of these territories will be determined by allied and United States garrisons holding the principal crossings of the Rhine, Mayenee, Coblenz, Cologne, together with bridgeheads at these points in 30-kilometer radius on the right bank and by garrisons similarly holding the strategic points
