THE DEMOCRATS.
MEET IN COUNTY CONVENTION.

A County Ticket Nominated Amid much Enthusiasm.

The court room at Paris, beautifully decorated with bunting, encircling pictures of past democrats and the present presidential nominee, was the scene of the democratic convention on Monday. Chairman Shepherd of the central committee called the delegates to order and in a good speech told them the object of the meeting.
On motion J. F. O'Connor was made temporary chairman and Alf Osmond temporary secretary.
A committee on credentials was appointed and a recess taken for thirty minutes. Upon reconvening it was found by their report that thirty eight of the forty delegates were present in person and two proxies from Montpelier were present.
A permanent organization was effected by selecting Joe Rich for chairman and Jos. Robinson secretary.
Committees on order of business and resolutions were then appointed.
A committee was also selected to confer with the populists, after which an adjournment till two o'clock was taken.
Upon assembling again the convention held an executive session to complete its deal with the populists. After a great deal of parleying, they finally sent word to the populists that they could have the coroner's office. This the latter rejected and in lieu asked for one commissioner and the probate judge. This offer was refused then the democrats proceeded to nominate a straight ticket.
For state senator, J. C. Rich was chosen by acclamation. He delivered a ringing speech in accepting the nomination.
For representatives the following named were put up: Jas Jennings, G. C. Hillier, Ed Pugmire and Chris Wallantine. After a close vote the last named two were nominated.
The biggest fight of the day came on the sheriffship, the following being candidates: J. H. Pierson, Jos. Jones, Mike Malone, H. H. Dalrymple and Amasa Rich. It required two ballots for Mr. Rich to get the necessary twenty

one votes.
Jos. Robinson was nominated by acclamation for Assessor on motion of Chas. Hoff who had intended making the race.
Alf Osmond and J. H. Miles were put forward for probate judge and the former was chosen.
For treasurer, Percy Shepherd was nominated over David Krogue and Marion Lindsay.
Robert Birch was nominated for surveyor without opposition.
Eph. Jones beat D. C. Stuart for Coroner.
The commissioners selected were as follows:

RESOLUTIONS.

The following is the report of the committee on resolutions:
First. We, the democratic party of Bear Lake county in convention assembled, hereby affirm our unswerving allegiance and support of the national platform adopted at Chicago and that of our state convention adopted at Boise City, and pledge ourselves to work for the principles enunciated by those conventions.
Second. We realize the injustice of our present fee system and recognize the burdens that are placed upon our tax payers to support the high and unreasonable salaries of county officials and pledge that all nominees of the convention shall accept their positions of trust with the distinct understanding that their emoluments in office shall be controlled and governed by such reductions in fees and salary as the legislature in its direction shall determine, and to this end the legislative nominees of this convention accept their positions with a sacred promise to the people that they will use every honorable effort for the reformation of our statutes in regard to these matters. And said legislative nominees are hereby in-tracted and prohibited from entertaining any petition from any deputation of citizens from this county agitating at the maintenance of our high salaries and fees.
Third. We demand that such laws be enacted at the coming legislature as will protect our ranges and the timbers of our mountains to actual bona fide residents and settlers of our state.
Fourth. We demand that the waters of our rivers and streams be utilized and the right to its uses be controlled by the residents and actual settlers, and that we discontinue in every form any attempt on the part of foreign corporations to control our irrigation facilities.
Fifth. We favor full endorsement of the three pending amendments to the constitution of our state and recommend their adoption by a vote of the electors.
