MEET IN CONVENTION.

Nominated A Straight County Ticket.

The members of the populist party in this county met in the opera house Saturday last and nominated a straight county and legislative ticket.

T. L. Glenn was made permanent chairman and Henry Rogers secretary. During the proceedings Frank Walton of Pocatello, delivered an address on the duties of the members of the people's party, after which the following nominations were made:

For representatives, Adam F. Segmiller and Thomas L. Glenn.
For sheriff, Joseph Jones.
For probate judge, Henry Margetts.
For assessor and collector, Henry F. Rogers.

For county commissioners: First district, Hyrum S. Rich; second district, Andrew Peterson; third district, Jasper Jennings.

Precinct officers: Montpelier, John A. Kelley, Joseph L. Hunter, justices; Frederick Sarbach, constable; Paris, John Norton, James Davis, justices; James C. Rich, constable.

TO THE VOTERS OF IDAHO:
For the purpose of information and to correct any misunderstanding relative to the attitude of the Democratic State Central Committee in this campaign, the committee deems it advisable to make the following statement:

There has never been any departure on the part of the Committee from the agreement entered into by the Democratic and People's party state conventions; nor has there ever been any intention to depart from or set

aside such agreement. The powers of the committee are executive only, and they deem it their duty to make every effort to carry out the wishes of the State Convention and to elect the entire ticket there nominated.

The democratic party was the first in this campaign to declare for the free and unlimited coinage of silver, at the present ratio, without waiting for the consent of any other nation. Great aid and assistance were given the silver movement by the action of those delegates who withdrew from the Republican National Convention, and that aid we fully appreciate and recognize, and inasmuch as the Silver republicans take a stand on the silver question identical with ours, and as we understand are in favor of reform in state and County affairs, we therefore favor and request them to put aside mere personal and individual ambitions and to join with us fully in electing the entire People's Democratic Ticket, to the end that our State as well as National affairs may be well managed.

This Committee is the only Democratic Committee in this state and the only one authorized to act for the Democratic party, and the only Committee recognized by the Democratic National Committee of which James K. Jones is chairman. Many reports to the contrary have been circulated, but they are wholly without foundation. The People's Democratic Ticket is the only Democratic ticket in the state recognized by the Democratic committee.

The Democratic State Central Committee have hitherto acted and they hereby declare their intention to continue to act, in harmony with the letter and spirit of the resolutions of the Democratic State Convention, and we urge every Democrat to do likewise.
