It may be of interest to the farmrs know that a Michigan farmer bas demonstrated sugar can be ny machinery. He simply grated the beets, pressed out the juice with a cider press and boiled it as you would boil the sap out of sugar
maple. During the process of boiling, he says the syrup had the flavor of the beet, but when sugared
off, it had the appearance and much the same flavor of maple sugar. From seventy pounds of beets he got six pounds of sugar thas been supposed heretofor that sugar couldn't be profitably made from beets without costly and periment opens a broad field for experiment and invention.
