

New Coal Town.

An Evanston special says Cumberland is the name of the new coal mining town being built on the Muddy by the Union Pacific. Four mines are now in progress of development. Two of these are ready to begin shipments as soon as the railroad reaches the town and the other two are undergoing their preparatory work. Eighty men are employed in and around the mines, but as soon as shipments are commenced the force will be increased to four or five hundred men.

The grade of the Union Pacific spur from Ham's Fork to Cumberland has been completed and the rails have been laid to within six miles of the town, which will form a junction, one end of the road running to Carter station and the other to the west end of the Aspen tunnel.

The coal veins being worked in two of the mines are nine and sixteen feet respectively. The company has built a large general store and a large number of cottages for the miners. Cumberland gives promise of becoming a close rival of Rock Springs as a coal producing town.

A New Board.

Governor Steunenberg has appointed a new board of commissioners for Nez Perce county. The men appointed are those chosen at the recent election, C. A. Leper, George W. Brammer and Perry E. Miller.

Must Vaccinate.

The Oregon Short Line has issued the following order:

"In view of the prevalence of smallpox throughout a large portion of the country traversed by the Oregon Short Line railroad, it is deemed to be very important that all employees and their families should submit to vaccination.

"It is hardly possible that all employees will escape this disease, and in cases of large aggregations of men, as at shops and terminals, as well as in consequence of the continuous intercourse along the line of the railroad, should the disease be contracted among the employees whole localities are liable to be put under quarantine, shops closed, and the most serious hardships and privations result to employees, as well as inconvenience to the public.

"In view of the situation, the management, after careful consideration, believes it is of the utmost importance that all employees, without exception, should promptly be vaccinated, and all are urgently requested to apply, without delay, to the company physicians, who will perform the service free of charge.

Lawyers Get a Divvy.

Judge Hiles yesterday made an order allowing Brown & Henderson \$5000 attorneys' fees for their services in the Bunting insurance case, which has been in the courts for several years. This is the largest amount allowed by the court for attorney fees in recent years. Colonel Ellis and other members of the bar testified that for the amount of work done and the sum involved \$5000 was a reasonable fee. Judge Hiles said he was of the same opinion, and made the order accordingly. The litigation grew out of the claims of the heirs of C. Bunting, deceased, the creditors of Bunting's bank in Idaho, and D. Wolstenholme to an insurance policy for \$50,000 on the life of C. Bunting.—Salt Lake Tribune.
