Many Changes.

The railway company is making many changes about the yards at this point. Roadmaster Renfro's office is now in a building opposite the depot. All the old buildings, except the pump house and car repairers office, have been torn down or moved. Everything is rapidly being cleaned up and in a few days the new order of things will be working in good shape.

Secretary Hitchcock has finally approved the plans of the engineer and has set aside out of the reclama tion fund, the sum of \$2,000,000 for the work of constructing an im. in June.

mense irrigation system. Water is to be taken from the Snake river at the head of the Minidoka rapids @ about six miles south of Minidoka, o a station on the Oregon Short Line railroad, and Spread over the great Snake plains.

At the point of diversion the formation in the bed of the river is solid lava rock, and the conditions are very favorable for the construction of a dam 50 feet high and the divergence of water on both sides of a river into canals for the irrigation of lands under them. Above the dam site for many miles the stream is in a canyon or a very narrow vallev from 40 to 150 feet below the bench lands, and the dam when constructed will back the water up for a distance of about 35 miles. Surveys of the river show that it is possible to irrigate by gravity about 68,000 acres of good land; in addition to this it is possible to divert about 3,000 cubic feet of water per second, which is appropriated by vested interests below, and by turning this back into the river generate over 10,000 horse power, which can be used to pump an ample supply of water to about 53,000 acres of land lying above the gravity canals, making a total area irrigable from this project of about 120,000 acres.

The engineers estimate that the cost of irrigation will be about \$25 per acre. Similar lands when reclaimed are selling at from \$40 to \$100 per acre.

To Have New Ordinances.

The city council has authorized the ordinance committee, in conjunction with City Attorney Glenn, to revise the old ordinances now in force, and to present several new ones, among which will be one providing for a health department. The latter is urgently needed since the city has attained its present size. The committee was instructed to report at the next meeting of the council.

New Sawmill.

The Examiner understands that a new sawmill is being erected up Montpelier canyon at the old dairy. It is said that a fine belt of timber growing in the west canyons above where the mill is tobe located. There is also a body of timber further up the canyon that can be reached by building a short piece of road. The new mill will be about 12 miles from this city.
