**Death of J. L. Dougherty.**

At the home of J. M. Richardson in this city last Sunday morning occurred the death of John L. Dougherty. Death was caused from consumption and hemorrhage.

Mr. Dougherty, whose home was in Pocatello, was a piano tuner and had been making semi-annual visits to Bear Lake county for the past three years. During his visit to the county last August he was taken with a severe hemorrhage while at Paris. Some of the good people of that town cared for him for two weeks and he then came to Montpelier with the intention of going to a lower altitude, but owing to his weakened condition he was unable to travel. Mr. Richardson took him into his home and ever since gave him every attention possible. A few weeks ago he showed slight signs of improvement and he felt that he would soon be able to travel, but the change was only for a day or two, when hemorrhages became more frequent, and he then realized that his lease of life was short.

His brother, David Dougherty, arrived about a month ago and assisted in caring for him during his last days. Learning of the sick man's helpless condition and that his brother was without means with which to purchase the necessary comforts for him, a subscription paper was circulated last Saturday and a considerable sum was raised for the purpose of paying nurse hire, etc., but death came as a relief to the sufferer on Sunday morning and the money was used in paying his funeral expenses.

Although not a communicant in the Mormon church, the deceased had expressed a belief in that religion and expressed the desire that Mormon services be conducted at his funeral. In accordance with that request the funeral was held from the L. D. S. meeting house Monday afternoon and his remains were laid to rest in the city cemetery.

The deceased was 38 years of age. He is survived by a father, two brothers, one sister and two daughters, aged 9 and 11 years, who are now being cared for in Denver.

**Dubois in Montpelier.**

Senator Fred T. Dubois, accompanied by C. H. Jackson, former chairman of the democratic state committee, arrived in Montpelier Tuesday on No. 2, and that evening the Senator addressed about 200 people in "Hager's hall." Notwithstanding the Senator is waging a warfare against the Mormon people and it was known his remarks would be directed against them, a majority of his audience were Mormons and more would have heard him had the hall been larger.

The Senator's speech was devoted exclusively to the "Mormon question" except that portion in which he threw bouquets at himself, and when it comes to self praise Fred is a dandy. He said that during his republican days in Idaho he was the recognized leader of the party in the state and he declared that he was now the undisputed leader of the democratic party. He patted himself on the back and said that he had been honored more than any other man in the state and that he would be re-elected to the senate by the next legislature. Maybe he will, but we doubt it.

He reviewed the part he took in the fight against the Mormons in the early days and said that he was fighting them today because, as he alleged, they were not living up to the terms of the manifesto. Much of his talk was on the bombastic order and in closing he intimated that the Mormons would be forced to take the test oath before being permitted to vote next Tuesday. This, of course, was done simply for the purpose of trying to scare the Mormons and keep them from going to the polls.

While the test oath is still a part of our constitution, the legislature has not prescribed it as the oath an elector must take before voting. The legislature, alone, has the power to prescribe the nature of the oath to be taken by an elector and the only oath that is found in our statutes is the one to which each elector subscribes when he registers and is the ONLY ONE that can be administered to an elector next Tuesday.

One result of the visit of Dubois and Jackson here has been the placing of a "Dubois" legislative ticket in the field. The candidates are E. F. Guyon for the senate, Ben Fitzpatrick and Joe McCart for the house. The few who vote for them will write their names on the ballot in blank places provided under the democratic state ticket.

The purpose of having the handful of Duboisites here vote for these men is that Dubois may have grounds for contesting the election of Borah to the senate.
