As we look at it the residents of Montpelier, living outside of the present sewer district, are making a mistake in not insisting that the council create sewer district No. 2, which will include practically all of the territory in the city that is not in

district No. 1. By creating district No. 2 at this time the property owners would thus acquire an interest in the trunk line of the sewer for approximately \$10,000. If they wait a year or more to create the district, it will likely cost them two or three times that sum to acquire an interest in the trunk line. The creating of sewer district No. 2 at this time, doesn't mean that the people in the district must connect up with the sewer right away. The creating of the district simply gives them the right to use the trunk line whenever they feel like doing so. They had better get in the district while the getting is comparatively cheap.
