STRAWBERRY SCUFFLE

Yolks three eggs, 1 c. sugar, 1 c. strawberry juice, 1 tbsps gelatine, 3-4 c. cold water, white 2 eggs, 1 c. whipping cream. Heat the fruit juice with 1-2 cup sugar. Add the yolks of the eggs, beaten with the remaining 1-2 cup sugar. Cook over hot water until thickened. Add the gelatine, softened in cold water. Stir until dissolved. Strain and cool in ice water. When the mixture begins to thicken, fold in the well beaten whites of eggs and the whipped cream. Turn the mixture into a mold and pack in ice and salt until chilled of partly frozen.
