The latest national returns in the exall presidential contest show a total of 798,169 votes cast, of which the women cast 199,707 and the men 598,462. The men gave Harding 56,842 votes and Cox 241,620 votes. The women gave Harding 125,255 votes and Cox 74,452 votes. Latest state returns show a total of 7,127 votes for Harding and 2,592 for Cox, a total of 10,719.

BLIND HUSBANDS
The ambition of Eric von Stroheim, who created the character of the despised and brutal Hun officer in that great picture "The Heart of Humanity," is to become the most hated villain on the screen.

With the men he will succeed, but with the women—that is a different story, for Stroheim has written, directed and starred in a picture in which he is seen as the most insidious love serpent that ever crept into an Eden's garden of willing Eves.

Stroheim wrote, directed and played the leading part—a villainous one—in "Blind Husbands," Universal's quality feature coming to the Rex Theatre, and Julian Johnson, editor of the Photoplay Magazine, declares the result to be "one of those miraculous things, which often occur in novels, but seldom in real life."
