HERBERT SPENCER, the famous author, died at his home in Brighton Tuesday morning. He was born in 1820 and was recognized as the "Last great thinker of the Victorian age."

SUPERINTENDENT of the Boise assay office, H. Smith Woolley, who was called to Washington a few days ago to answer to some charges made against him during his term as Internal Revenue Collector, has satisfied the authorities that he is innocent and his appointment will be confirmed.

A SPECIAL to the Pocatello Tribune from St. Anthony yesterday, says:

"Heretofore certain resorts have disregarded every law of public decency until they have become the hotbeds of vice and crime. Ante rooms have been turned into public cribs, infested by decrepit, infirm and wasted old hags, worn out blisters and gilded battleaxes who appear in an almost perfect state of nature to lure and debauch the young. Night is made hideous with their screams, mingled with the carousal of pimps, pimps, pimps and bibulous bipeds who crowd the inside. The city council has taken a determined stand to put a stop to it, hence the passage of the present ordinance."

CARDINAL GIBBONS in his sermon at the cathedral at Baltimore last Sunday denounced the "sweat shops," and appealed to his hearers to discriminate in making purchases in favor of employers who treat their employees with justice and charity. The text of his sermon was "Am I My Brother's Keeper?" and in the course of it he said:

"Many of these workers, men and women, are compelled to toil in sweat shops, of which there is little space. They are overworked and underpaid. After a careful investigation I have discovered that after laboring for six days, at ten or twelve hours a day, their weekly compensation amounts to six or eight dollars. And with this pittance they have to pay for house rent, food and clothing."

The opposition to the sugar beet bounty over in the west end of the state is but another illustration of the selfishness which has taken possession of some of the narrow contracted consciences over there. The howl is going up that it is an imposition upon the people to impose this bounty, but they have the unmitigated gall to collect a big tax from the people of eastern Idaho for an old wagon road which is of

little benefit to anyone. The sugar beet bounty bill is responsible for the location within the state of one of the greatest industries of the west, and because Bingham and Fremont counties were the places selected for the erection of the factories because of the unlimited agricultural area, some Boise fellows are going to try and get the supreme court to knock out the act of the legislature. Five years will see the state reimbursed for every cent of bounty paid on sugar by the increase of taxes on these gigantic concerns, and thousands of people will be given employment in the meantime.
