### GORGAS PLANS PEST WAR.

Back From Guayaquil With Scheme For Cleaning Port.

Washington.-Colonel William C. Gorgas, head of the sanitary work in the Panama canal zone, has presented recemmendations for the sanitation of Guayaquil, Renador, known for many years as the "posthole of the Pacific." to Secretary Knox. Colonel Gorgas said:

"I found conditions at Guayaquil sim-Har to those which we met at liavana when we went there some years ago to rid it of fever and infection. There seems to be no reason why Guayaquifcannot be made as safe a harbor from a health point of view as any other. The people there realize the importance of cleaning up if they want to enjoy the benefits to be derived from the commerce of the canal.

"The city has a partial water supply and the first thing it needs is a pipe line giving a fresh, pure water supply. I found in the hospitals seventy cases of plague, and this would disappear with the yellow fever if better saultation were secured.
