In Ceredo School Now at Catlettsburg High School.

In a phone conversation with Superintendent McCorkle of the Catlettsburg schools Superintendent Grady learns that the pictures for the art exhibit to be held in the Ceredo school building next week are now on exhibit in the Catlettsburg high school where the exhibit is being held this week. Our people ought to do as much as the Catlettsburg people in supplying pictures for our schools.

The pictures are loaned by the Elson Art Co., of Boston, who are by all odds the largest manufacturers of the copies of the great world masterpieces in the U. S. An interesting feature in connection with the exhibit is the contest in the grades for one of the prize pictures.

The grades from one to four securing the most money for its grade will secure the copy of a picture entitled "Wake Up." The grade from five to eight securing the most money for the art fund will be given a copy of the picture "The Spirit of 76." These pictures will be on exhibit in Wright Brothers window until the exhibit is over.

Any one can contribute enough for a picture who may desire to do so or any organization may do so. Already two pictures of ten dollars value have been promised by organizations. Any organization or individual giving a picture will have his name fixed to the frame as the donor.
