AMERICAN BIRDS THAT TRAVEL FASTER THAN THE WIND

Remarkable Records Made by Carrier Pigeons i This Country-Notable Endurance and Instinct of the Feathered Flyers.

pigeons which I have specified, if tutored while young, will gradually develop into a perfect carrier, with a capability of traveling from 50 to 500 miles. Frequently some are so well trained to fly after a year's trial a much longer distance. I own two mates which have flown 700 miles. The price for birds is as changeable as the heavens. When sold to start a loft, the youngsters, or squealers, as they are appropriately termed, fetch from \$3 to \$4 per air, and the old ones cost all the way om \$10 to \$100 per set. "The system employed in training is

simple when once understood, but food. ately some fanciers have changed this node. To start a loft a person has to take irds which have never flown out of the coop, because they will be over restless to eturn when liberated at any distant point. The best way to train, in my opinion, is to send them out first on short flies, begin ning at two or three miles, then seven and ten, fifteen and twenty, forty and sixty, 100 and 225, 375 to 500 miles. short races are chiefly to make them with the position and neighborhood of their home or loft. rank folly to start training a bird before it has reached the age of at least five weeks. It should be allowed to fly about the loft until it gets that old. There is a difference of opinion among anciers as to whether the birds take their flight exclusively by sight or by instinct. I sustain the latter belief, and am positive no other faculty is employed. How can a pigeon, which has been expressed on the cars for hundreds of miles manage to return to his loft exclusively by sight? It is true that in rainy weather, or when the atmosphere is laden with fog, he will not attempt to fly, but that is not sufficient proof that he cuts out the direction of his travels by sight. The bird controls a marvelous eyesight, but he assuredly cannot ee his loft several hundred miles away. "Do homers ever fly at night?"
