TERribly SCALDED.

A Serious Accident at the Riverside Steel

Plant, Yesterday Morning.

Between three and four o'clock yesterday

morning a very serious accident oc-

curred at the Riverside steel plant, in

Woodstock, resulting in the serious scalding

of one of the workmen. Edward Brosche,

a resident of this city, who is the engineer

of the plant, and a man of great interest, and

he said that it would in any way con-

flict with the strict iron product or galvanizing

merchant iron turned out by the mill.

Mr. C. W. Brockmeyer said: "The bill,
