QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS, -- In the correspondence column of the last N. Y. Times and Messenger, we find the following interesting questions and answers:

Query:-"Is the style of manners essentially different from what it was five and twenty years ago? For instance, I am walking with two fadies, when a gentleman joins us who is acquainted with the ladies, but not with me, engages in conversation, and, in fact, makes himself one of the party. How would this be regarded by the

Answer: -The manners of the present day, in this latitude, partake largely of what would be called "the free-and-easy," the principal ingredient of which is impudence; and to that category belongs such a case as that to which you refer. A quarter of a century ago, no gen-tleman would have included in such an act of rudeness. Manners were then more ceremonious, and intrusion was looked upon as a high ocial effence. Now, the miscellaneous element which mixes up everybody with everybody prevails; good and bad are freely mingled, and a bold front is a substitute for the more substantial qualities of goodness and intelligence. Austor: -The eliquette of boarding-house life seems to be imperfectly understood. Primarily, the persons who congregate at beardinginnises do so for their convenience, to secure rooms and meals. The society is incidental, and no one boarder can make a demand upon another for any more than the ordainry civilities of strangers, encountering at table or eisewhere. Killing off time in the parlor is not to be taken in too serious part, not to be considered as indicating any special preference which requires to be "followed op." If the young lady chooses to express an interest in any partieular species of amusement, we suppose that she is at perfect liberty to do so; but if she grows nthusiastic on the subject with a view of secu ring an escort thereto, we have no doubt that the gentleman is fully justified in holding himself indifferent to the appeal.

Accidental coincidences, and even intentional coveyances of ideas, are numerous enough, and occureven in writers of acknowledged genius; but no one, therefore, denies that they are men of genius, or falls to discern that, taken altogether, their writings differ essentially from those of other authors. It is the law of a man of genius to be original. He imitates by accident, and borrows as the exception. The plagiarist steals, as it were, for a living, and can never be honest or original, even by accident. The entire manner of an author is quite as much his own, and as clearly distinguishes him from all other writers, as any separate or special ideas or fancies which he may

SNUFF-DIPPING AMONG THE WOMEN OF THE Sourn .- A correspondent of the Petersburg (Va.) Express says:

"There are, perhaps, in our state, one hundred and twenty five thousand women, leaving out of the account those who have not cut their teeth, and those who have lost them from age. Of this number, eighty per cent, may be safely set down as snuff-dippers. Every five of these will use a two onnce paper of smulf per day-that is, to the hundred thousand dippers, two thousand five hundred pounds a day, amounting in one year to the chormous quantity of nine hundred and twelve thousand pounds. In this number of snuff-dippers are included all ages, colors and

This practice is generally prevalent among the poor whites, and is akin to the practice of clay or dirt enting, which only they, savages and politicians, are known to indulge in. It is preva-lent in the pine districts of North Carolina, and many portions of South Carolina, Georgia, Alabama, Florida, and castern Tennessee. It may be thus described:

"A female smill-dipper takes a short stick, and wetting it, dips it into her snuff box, and then rubs the gathered dust all about her month nto the interstices of her teeth, &c., where she allows it to remain until its strength is fully absorbed. Others hold the stick thus leaded with snuff in the cheek a la quid of tobacco, and suck it with a decided relish while engaged in their NUMBER 174
