THE FUGITIVE SLAVE JACKSON. - The Zanesville Courier gives some account of the fugitive slave Jackson, who was recently arrested in that city and taken back to his master. Jackson was claimed as a fugitive from service by Mr. James Jackson, of Clarksburg, Va. He (the fugitive) has resided in Belmont county, Ohio, for three years past. His arrest was accomplished as follows, according to the Courier:

Some days since a Mr. Honeycutt called on J. C. Simpson, a colored man of this city, and told him that Jackson had been guilty of bastardy with a white girl; that the girl had been driven from the family with whom she had resided, (the same family in which Jackson had lived,) and went to a sister's, who, upon the birth of the child turned her out of doors; that her entire family had discarded her; that the girl was a distant relative of his; that her family were desirous to remove the stain, as far as possible, and to that end, had concluded, that if they would marry and remove to Canada, they would furnish them with \$500 as an outfit.

McSimpson took the next train west; met Honeycutt at the Depot in this city, and advised him that Jackson was on the road.
