### ARBUCKLE FOR FREE SUGAR

Declares Tariff is Wicked Tax to Benefit Beet Sugar Interests of the Country.

**WILL MAKE WAR FOR REPEAL OF TARIFF**

Declares Uncle Sam Takes Third of Price of Each Pound of Sugar at Present.

NEW YORK, Oct. 12.—Before sailing for Europe today John Arbuckle issued a statement strongly attacking the tariff on raw sugar, declaring it to be a "wicked tax" for the benefit of the sugar interests. In his statement Mr. Arbuckle said:

"I am going abroad to meet and to represent in preparation for the fight to be made in congress at its next session for free sugar. I propose to devote all my time and all my ability and all my strength to the abolition of all import duties on raw sugar, a most wicked tax on a food necessity of all our people. It taxes the man who works for a wage of a dollar a day as much as it taxes an Astor or Mr. Morgan or Mr. Rockefeller. Each eats, or at least needs, the same amount of sugar, and they pay not according to their ability, but according to their needs, reversing an elemental rule of taxation."

"Just look at these figures, showing how the prices of refined sugar to the consumer is made up. I disregard the abnormal price lately prevailing for the raw product and take a normal price:

"Price paid by New York refiners for raw sugar, 24 cents.

"Duty, per pound, 1.65 cents.

"With the raw sugar costing the refiner 4.05 cents per pound, his price to wholesale grocers for granulated sugar is about 4.90 cents per pound and the wholesale grocers' net price to the New York retail grocers per pound is about 4.95 cents, and

**Levy Fixed.**

The city rate is proportioned as follows: State, 4.51 mills; county, 2.65 mills; county pike, .75 mills; city tax, 4.15 mills; city school, 2.85 mills; township, .14 mills; total, 11.960 mills.

At the beginning of business to-day, the condition of the United States treasury was: Working balance in treasury offices, \$78,452,183; in banks and Philippine treasury, \$24,225,984. The total of the general fund was \$137,696,257. Receipts yesterday were \$2,213,377. Disbursements were \$2,801,321. The deficit to date this fiscal year is \$21,791,789 as against a deficit of \$11,261,964 at this time last year. These figures exclude Panama canal and public debt transactions.

### ASKS CITIZENSHIP

Ex-U. S. Soldier Desires to Become a Citizen of His Country.

The unusual spectacle of a man who has served six years in the United States army asking to be naturalized and become a citizen of the country whose flag he has served, was presented in the filing of an application for citizenship by Wilhelm Maish, aged 31 years. Maish has been a resident of the United States for eight years, having spent two years in this city. He is eligible to citizenship under the regular naturalization law, but owing to his service in the army will not have to fulfill certain conditions required of civilians. In entering the army he was required to declare his intention of becoming a citizen of the United States and is now fulfilling out the conditions then laid upon him.

### HUNT ITALIAN

Angry New Jersey Mob Bent on Lynching Murderer Hiding in Woods.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Oct. 12.—An armed mob composed of angry Italian farmers is scouring the mainland woods back of Northfield today, ready to wreak vengeance on a Sicilian known as Tony, who last night shot down Marino Italiano and his mother while they were seated at the supper table. The mother was injured in the hip while trying to protect her son, who was shot three times. He is barely alive.
