RAISING THE LITTLE FRED

DIVERS AIDED IN LIFTING SUNKEN STEAMBOAT.

Ohio Is Declining Slowly at This Port—Packets Detained By Heavy Business.

Under the direction of Captain Lewis Mank, submarine divers and working crews are making good progress in the work of raising the towboat Little Fred, which turned turtle in the Ohio river near Steubenville last Thursday afternoon, during a strong wind storm. A number of chains have been placed under the hull and it is expected that the boat will be pumped out and floated by Saturday. The boat is but slightly damaged.

Business Detains Packets. Heavy business and fog detained the steamer Kanawha several hours yesterday morning and the boat did not leave the local wharf until noon, carrying one of the largest cargoes of the season. The Greenwood was also several hours late as a result of heavy shipments. The Liberty got away for Clarington at 3:30 o'clock.

River Declining Rapidly. The Ohio and its tributaries are falling rapidly and yesterday afternoon a stage of 3 feet 6 inches was registered at the local port. It is expected that the wickets at the various dams will be put in place within a few days unless another rise matures.

JURY DIASGREES

In Case of James Bachman, Charged With Conducting a Gambling Room in the City.

After deliberating for over two and one-half hours and being hopelessly divided, the jury in the case of the State vs. James Bachman, on trial in the Criminal Court on the charge of conducting a gambling room, was discharged shortly before 6 o'clock last evening by Judge Jordan.

The case was one appealed from the police court Bachman and "Dodge" Fisher, both having been fined \$20 and costs each and sentenced to serve 30 days in the work house. City Solicitor Addelman represented the City and State in the case and S. O. Boyce the defense. The testimony of several witnesses was to the effect that Bachman had met them on the street and invited them into the building at No. 1139 Market street where a poker game was in progress and they admitted to playing with varying success.

Some of the witnesses said they were not invited in by Bachman and had only seen him passing through. Others had not seen him at all.

After the State rested Attorney Boyce made a motion to dismiss the case but the motion was overruled and the case was completed and given to the jury about 3 o'clock.

CORNERSTONE

St. Stephen's Church Will Celebrate Cornerstone Laying On Sixteenth of June.

On Sunday, June 16, the congregation of the St. Stephen's church on the South Side will celebrate the tenth anniversary of the laying of the cornerstone of the building and also of the organization of the missionary society. On the same date, the pastor Rev. E. M. Preuss will also celebrate the fifteenth anniversary of his ordination into the clergy.

While the arrangements are far from being complete, an interesting program of special exercises will be rendered on the occasion. Matters pertaining to the celebration will be taken up at a meeting of the women of the missionary society to be held tomorrow evening.

Rev. Preuss accepted the pastorate of the church in 1902, coming to this city from Beaver, O. At that time the congregation was holding meetings in a hall, but a few months later the present church building was started. In the past ten years the congregation has had a very rapid growth.

VETERAN RIVERMEN

Capt. Ira Huntington, Formerly in Command of Virginia, in Wheeling Wednesday.

Capt. Ira B. Huntington, of Gallipoli, O., veteran riverman and steamboat captain, was in Wheeling on brief business last Wednesday. Capt. Huntington is well known to rivermen the length of the Ohio. His last command was the Steel City, for nearly the Virginia, of which he was in charge when the luckless craft made her maiden voyage from Cincinnati to Pittsburgh, over fifteen years ago.

BONIFAC DAY

German Catholics Throughout the World Will Celebrate Anniversary of Only German Saint.

On Sunday, June 9th, at 10 o'clock a. m., the male members of the German Catholic churches throughout the entire country will observe St. Boniface Day, with special ceremonies. This will be the first year in this city, and arrangements are now being made to make this day one of which will be long remembered. Following Ed. Strautman, John Hohman, Jacob Mueller, Sr., Wm. Miller, Robt. Fekre, and Christian Stettin. The first three named represent St. Alphonsus church and the latter three Knights of St. George, No. 30.

There will be a short parade, of about 1,000 men starting from the German-Columbia club, up Market to Twentieth and down to Main street, down Main to Twenty-second street,

up Twenty-second to St. Alphonsus church, where special services will be held.

St. Boniface was the only German Saint, and the German Catholics throughout the world celebrate his anniversary, but in this city no special exercises were ever held. Hereafter, it will be an annual event, and observed just the same as St. Patrick's Day or any other Saints day. The anniversary is on Wednesday, June 9th, but owing to the mid-week date, Sunday, June 9th, will be the festival day. Rev. Father Francis, of the St. Alphonsus church will be the celebrant of the Mass.

IMPORTANT ORDER

Entered by Judge Nesbitt in Case of the Commercial Bank vs. Waterhouse Bros.

In the circuit court yesterday Judge Nesbitt handed down an order in the case of the Commercial bank vs. Waterhouse Bros., confirming the report of Commissioner W. E. Krupp, and ordering the distribution of some of the funds now in the hands of the receivers. The order also refers to the fraudulent transfers of certain stock in the Wheeling Steel & Iron Co., and directs that the parties so receiving the stock pay to the receivers its market value on February 23, which was \$150 per share, or turn over to the receivers the stock certificates. It also instructs the receivers to pay themselves the sum of \$1,200 each for their services, and also to Attorneys Fesikine & Allison the sum of \$2,700 for their services in the case. The residue is to apply pro rata on the debt of the concern. The court also orders the sale of certain property belonging to the Waterhouse estate.
