## FEMININE CHAT AND CHITTY

GOSSIP AND ADVICE FOR  
THE WORLD OF WOMEN.

Hatpins Glistening With Rhinestones Are Becoming Favorites—They Vary in Price According to Size and Brilliance and Make Most Acceptable Presents. Up-to-date Lingerie Frocks.

In hunting for party prizes a pair of hat pins will surely be acceptable. It is no longer fashionable to wear half a dozen different kinds of pins in one hat, thus most women are glad for a set that matches.

The amount of the spent upon these pins is only limited by the inclination and purse of the hostess. Good-looking beetle pins set in brass, and dull-colored scarabs can be had for as little as 25 cents. These are especially liked by young girls.

The favorite hat pins are those of rhinestones. These vary in price from 75 cents to many dollars, according to size and brilliancy. There are various shapes in the rhinestone pins, but those that stand out from the hat, either in a bill or cone shape, show the brilliancy of the stones much more than the flat ones.

Some of these pins are in butterfly shape, with both sides of the outstanding wings studded with stones while the body is full and thickly jeweled. Other designs are in flower shapes, with the petals distinct. Often the heart of the flower is of a colored stone or enamel, while the petals only are of rhinestone.

To have a strictly up-to-date lingerie dress it must be made in peasant style and be trimmed with Russian embroidery. Although consisting of the sheerest quality of embroidered dotted batiste and English eyelet embroidery, with buttons of wonderful metal embroideries, the frock is distinguished for its simplicity. The skirt, of the new straight, full order, is caught in at the feet with a deep band of allover embroidery, extending up either side and forming panels. The fullness of the simple bodice is drawn into the normal waistline and the seams of the shirring covered by a peasant braid of red and white cotton. From the seamless shoulder the sleeve extends the entire length of the arm, the lower half being of the allover embroidery.

Bright colors are being introduced for the early spring wear. Most women will resent this intrusion of vivid coloring. Subdued effects that have prevailed for the last two seasons have been generally satisfactory, but with the introduction of a "touch" of color the death knell of conservatism is rung, as color is bound to be overdone this spring and summer.

## Spring Colors.

It is wise, when deciding on the color for your spring suit, to choose shades that are neutral. The grays, tans or dull greens admit of a combination with any other colors in the hats, decoration or accessories, and, of course, black and white are excellent as contrasting additions.

Nothing is so disappointing as a vivid, trying shade of cloth that on account of its unsuitableness is expensive, and therefore must be doctored again and again, with a weariness to wearers and onlookers.

It is always best to rely upon little details of embroidery or trimming for the intense color notes. The background should be of a becoming and inconspicuous tone that wears better, keeps cleaner and generally possesses a dignity that the more blatant shades lack.

When Afraid to Shampoo. Some women whose hair is thick and who are sensitive to cold, dread having their hair shampooed frequently. To keep the scalp clean under such conditions, great care is necessary.

Brush the scalp carefully, dividing the hair into strands. This loosens all dandruff, which should be shaken from the hair by loosening it and holding it at arm's length.

Rubbing the scalp with a sponge dipped in which hazel is a good substitute for a regular shampoo. There are also certain proprietary preparations for scalp cleansing and dandruff removing which do not necessitate wetting the long hair.

## Jewel Shades.

These jewel shades in rich silken fabrics have not been equaled in anything shown heretofore. Burnt topaz is a remarkable shade of deep rich yellow. Ruby is the deep red of the popular late-winter dinner gown. Amethyst in these soft qualities of wonderful dress silk is more pale than purple. The turquoise is a heavenly shade and aquamarine is an indescribable pale green.

## Maline Is Here.

Crimp maline bows that are as light as air enlarge the latest Paris hats without adding weight. This filmy stuff stands out and away from the head in huge and numerous bows, wired invisibly to produce the effect desired. Whole crowns of maline, crushed into shape, belong to the rarer-wreathed creations now selling in

Paris.

Roses are veiled in this soft tissue or nestled in it when their colors are not too bright for the wearer. Swathed round a crown without a brim, the sheer gauzes and laces form an East Indian or an Arabian turban when held together by a jeweled quill or clasped by a huge ornament. Beads strung in ropes are wrapped with the maline that is twisted into some of the most graceful turbans.

Whole crowns are covered with up-standing bows of folded maline, and loops of it are wired high, to give the cigarette effect without the cigarette.

## Fancy Net Turbans.

The flowered turban has given way to a large one made of coarse fancy net. The same kind is used that we have had for gown drapery during the winter. Brilliant colors are seen, such as purple, the new vivid dark blue, black, white with a black spot and Chanticleer red.

The turbans are an artistic mass of this net twisted into puffs and loops and ends. The latter are wired in order to keep their shape and give the turban character.

## Sleeve Revival.

A revival asking for recognition this spring on the score of prettiness is the undersleeve of lace or net bouffant at the wrist. The sleeve proper is tight-fitting to below the elbow, and then discovers the bouffant, which both spoils the outline of the attitude and looks untidy and too often dirty into the bargain.

Blue serge is, as always, well to the front for early spring wear, enlivened with the rich tints of the Roumanian and Persian embroideries; but the neutral shades are all favored, especially gris hironde, a foretaste of the days when the swallow will have returned to us and the winter be past—at least, we hope so, for hope invariably rises superior to experience in spring time, which too often bears out the truth of the proverb that one swallow does not make a summer.

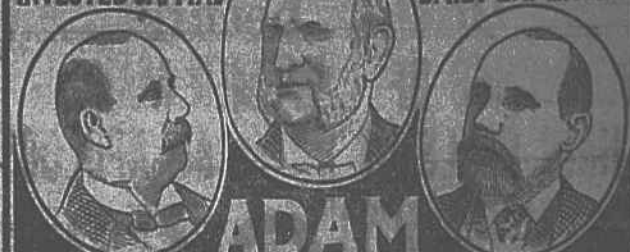
