ABOUT TOWN.

Just received a fine assortment of fresh candies at the Crystal Ice Cream Parlors.

The schooner Olga arrived off Brazos Santiago early this afternoon, with a cargo of merchandise from Galveston.

A general court martial has been detailed to meet at Fort Brown, June 2, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon. The detail of the board is as follows: Captains E. V. Smith and John O. Switzer, Fourth Infantry; First Lieutenants Wiley Howell, Frederick W. Van Dusen, R. W. Hardenbergh, Fourth Infantry; Second Lieutenants Joseph C. Brady, John H. Baker and John C. The money set aside for the Goliad cyclone sufferers from the proceeds of the Lawn Party, which was one-half of the net receipts, was not sent to the parish priest at Goliad, as stated in yesterday's HERALD, but has been turned over by Rev. Father Phoye to Mayor Carson, who will forward it to the county judge of Goliad. The amount of this donation is \$33.77, Mexican coin, which is equivalent to about \$15 in U. S. currency, and raises the total of Brownsville's contributions for the aid of the storm stricken town to \$84.

The solemn mass of requiem which was offered at the Pro-Cathedral this morning, for the repose of the soul of the late Charles F. Fagout, jr., was largely attended by sympathizing friends of the family. Tomorrow will be the first anniversary of the death of this young man, whose early demise is still mourned as deeply as when he was laid in the grave twelve months ago, the victim of an accident. The deceased was the beloved grandson of Mrs. S. W. Brooks of this city.
