Editor Herald—Thinking that the people are desirous of some public expression in regard to the progress of Small-Pox in our county, I state we have had five cases up to yesterday. All the cases are in house No. 1, occupied by Sam Nelson and family. There are seven of them quarantined in this house, five of which have the disease, leaving only two young boys yet to take. None of the eleven, exposed in house Nos. 2 and 3 have taken; after next Wednesday the danger of their contracting the disease will be over and I will raise the quarantine on these eleven, provided no case occurs among them between now and Wednesday. The quarantine against Sam Nelson's family will be rigidly enforced until the disease exhausts itself for the want of material, which it will soon do. The people of our county and of our two adjoining counties are not in any danger whatever of infection.
