

## Stranded in South Bend In Two Years Search For Lover; Finally Wins

Dan Cupid completed a chase Thursday night in Detroit that has been going on for two years—some of the striking scenes having been enacted in South Bend—when he succeeded in uniting a couple that have been in search of each other through-out cities in northern Indiana and southern Michigan for more than 26 months. A wedding took place.

The principal characters in the affair were Vincent Karawas, 28, of Detroit, and Miss Mary Bergel, 26. The two were separated more than two years ago and since then a continual search has been made by both parties. The woman trailed her

bride-groom-elect to South Bend, but she was stranded here for several months.

He evidently left the city shortly after her arrival. She was employed during her stay here as a domestic, being compelled to earn the money for the search. After leaving South Bend she went to Michigan City, then to Grand Rapids, and other Michigan cities before finally learning that he was in Detroit. His attempts to learn of her whereabouts were in vain and not once during the two years did he guess that the woman he was in search of was following slowly behind him unraveling every clue that might lead to him.

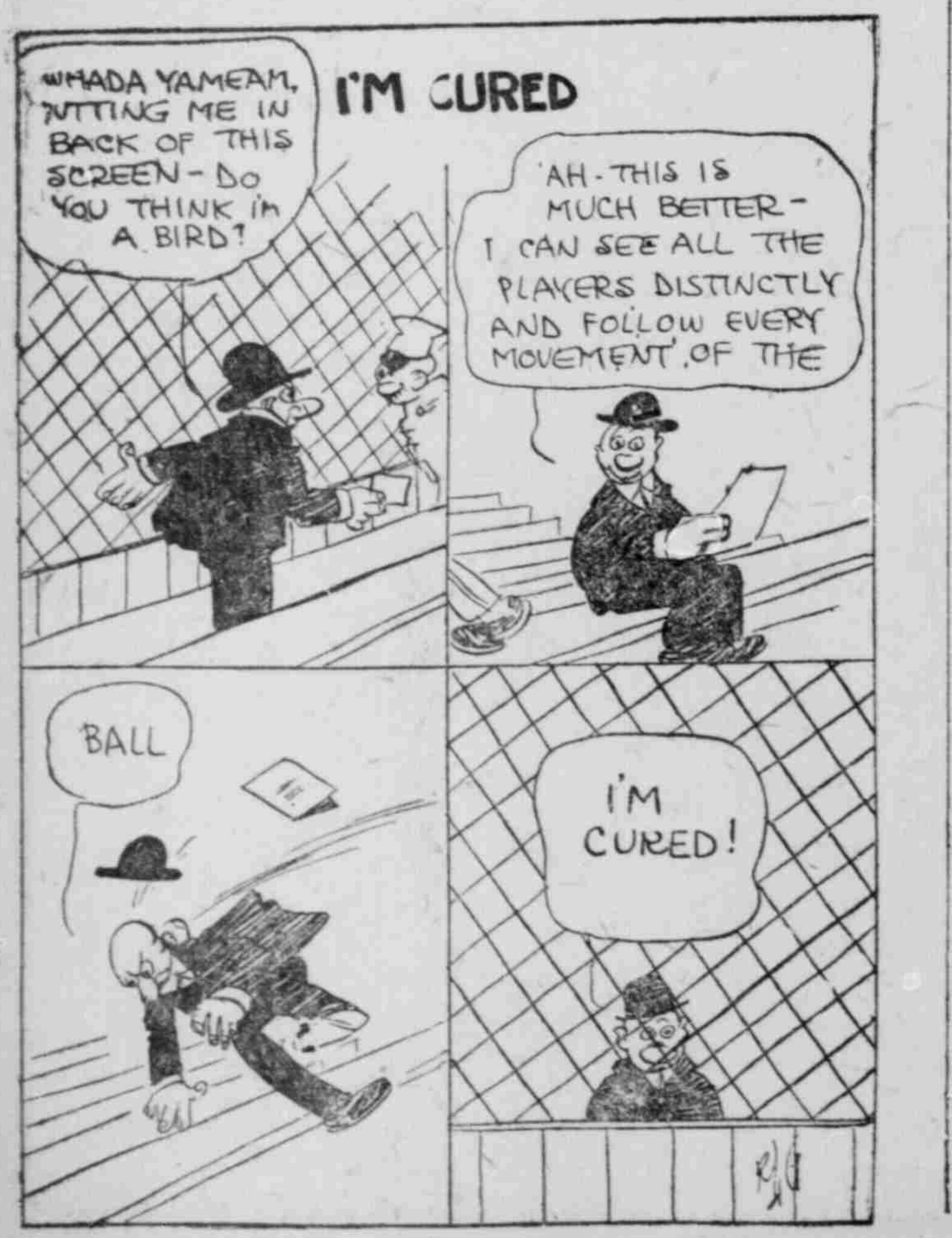
### TAFFETA TRIMS HATS INSTEAD OF FEATHERS

**THREE KILLED WHEN TRAIN STRIKES AUTO.**  
EDWARDSVILLE, Ill., May 15.—Three persons were killed at Kaufmann, Ill., a village near here today, when a Clover Leaf passenger train struck an automobile. The dead are: J. P. Stuckwisch and wife, and Oscar Meier, all of Marine, Ill. The automobile was demolished and the bodies were so badly mutilated that they were identified only by means of the automobile license. Stuckwisch was enroute to Jacksonville, Ill., to visit Mrs. Stuckwisch's mother.

Harry Groot, engineer of the train, said he did not see the automobile until his engine struck it.

CHICAGO, May 15.—Mrs. George Post was killed and three persons were injured, one seriously today, when an automobile in which they were riding turned turtle near Chicago Heights. Otto Yeager, a teaming contractor, and owner of the car, suffered a broken shoulder.

The dead woman's husband identified the body at the morgue.

NEW YORK—The servant problem has been solved by a clause in Mrs. Mary J. Sisson's will which gives her servant a trust fund of \$5,000 as long as she remained with her husband's family. Mrs. Sisson did not want to see her husband without competent help.

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**HEARING ON WORKING WOMEN'S CONDITION NOT TO BE HELD HERE.**  
The public hearing on the conditions of working women in the cities of Indiana by the commission appointed by the legislature will be held at Indianapolis May 25, instead, as was planned, in South Bend, May 18. The report of the commission will be given by Miss Marie L. Oberauer, of the government bureau of statistics, in charge of the corps of workers in the state co-operating with the state commission. The object of the real commission is to find out the real conditions as to wages, sanitation, safety and other conditions surrounding women that work in mills, factories and other places of industrial employment. The state commission is headed by Mrs. Virgil A. Lockwood of Indianapolis and Mrs. W. E. Miller of South Bend.
