

ENGLAND'S SIDE OF BREAK WITH GERMANY GIVEN

Says Kaiser's Representatives
Refused to Withdraw From
Belgium as It Was Their Aim
to Strike Quickly.

LONDON, Aug. 28.—A "White Paper" giving the report of Sir William Goschen, former ambassador at Berlin, on the breaking off of diplomatic relations with Germany was issued by the British foreign office Thursday night.

The report under date of Aug. 8 cites the instructions of Sir Edward Grey, secretary of state for foreign affairs, to call upon the German secretary of state, Gottlieb von Jagow, which he complied with inquiring whether Germany would refrain from violating the neutrality of Belgium.

Herr von Jagow said his reply must be negative because the German troops had crossed the frontier that morning and would not explain why they had thus violated Belgium's neutrality. "It was a matter of life or death for them," said the report, "and they had to advance into France by the quickest and easiest way in order to strike some decisive blow as early as possible. The loss of time in going by the southern route would mean time gained by the Russians for the bringing up of their troops to the German frontier. Rapidly of action was the German asset while that of Russia was the inexhaustible supply of troops."

Held It Impossible.
Ambassador Goschen said he asked Herr von Jagow if there was not still time to draw back and he replied: "It is impossible."

The British ambassador that same afternoon again visited the German foreign office and stated his position, saying that if the imperial government could not give assurance by 12 o'clock that night that they would desist he must ask for his passports.

Herr von Jagow replied that "if the time given were 24 hours or more his answer must be the same."

The ambassador then visited Dr. Von Bethmann-Hollweg, the imperial chancellor. Concerning their interview the report says:

"The chancellor began a harangue which lasted about 20 minutes. He said the step taken by Great Britain was terrible to a degree. Just for a word, 'neutrality'—a word which in war time had been so often disregarded—just for a scrap of paper Great Britain was going to make war on a kindred nation who desired nothing better than to be friends with her. What we (Great Britain) had done was unthinkable. It was like striking a man from behind while he was fighting for his life against two assailants."

He explained to him that if strategic reasons it was a matter of life and death to Germany to advance through Belgium, it also was a matter of life or death for the honor of Great Britain that she could keep her solemn engagement to do her utmost to defend Belgium's neutrality. His excellency was so excited that I refrained from adding fuel to the flame by further argument."

The British ambassador says he handed a telegraphic report of his conversation to the telegraph office in Berlin, but it never reached the British foreign office.

The report then recites the visit of Herr Zimmermann, under secretary of state, to Sir William Goschen to inquire if the request by the latter for his passports was equivalent to a declaration of war, the ambassador's evasive reply thereto and Herr Zimmermann's acceptance of the fact that it was such a declaration.

The subsequent attack on the embassy by a mob and the expressions of regret by Herr von Jagow and by the emperor himself for the occurrence are reviewed. The ambassador is adding words of praise for the German diplomatic officials for their courteous treatment of him after the rupture of relations.

ARCADIAN BRINGS BACK AMERICANS

Dubbed the Millionaires' Ship
Because Lowest Price Accepted
for Accommodation
Was \$500.

NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—The Arcadian of the Royal Mail Steam Packet company reached port Thursday night from Liverpool with 192 American refugees from the war zone on board. The steamer was dubbed "the millionaires' ship" because the lowest price accepted for accommodation was \$500 and the highest paid was \$2,500.

When the Royal Mail company announced in London its intention of sending the Arcadian to New York to relieve the congestion on other steamers opposition to the scheme was strenuously made. The American relief committee in London refused to recommend the Arcadian and stranded Americans were informed that other vessels would be sailing about the same time as the Arcadian and that only the usual rates would be charged.

This resulted in many persons cancelling the reservation and making the Arcadian and the steamer finally put to sea on Aug. 17 with half her cabins unoccupied.

When the passengers heard of the discomforts that their fellow countrymen had experienced in the steerage and overcrowded cabins on other liners they said they were thankful to have traveled on the Arcadian even at the advanced price. The steamer carried no cargo and the trip was anything but profitable.

OPPOSED TO BANK NOTES

Troops Needed to Quell Uprising at
Mexico City.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—An uprising in Mexico City against the circulation of bank notes and currency of the new Carranza government has been put down by troops. The state department announces that confidential advisers late Thursday state that there has been a "misunderstanding" between the populace in the Mexican capital and the government, but that order has been restored.

FEDERAL TROOPS TO BE RELEASED

War Department Announces
That Interned Mexicans Will
Be Allowed to Go—Will Hold
Officers.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—The war department announces that on guarantees of protection from Carranza, the 5,000 interned Mexicans at Forts Wingate and Rosencranz will be permitted to return to their country.

The cost to the United States of keeping these Mexican soldiers and camp followers has been about \$500,000. No arrangement has yet been made for the repayment of this outlay.

The officers who crossed to the American side and are held by the United States are not to be released until later.

Constitutionalist headquarters on Thursday say that they have received news that Raymond and Rafael Cabrera, brothers of Luis Cabrera, were assassinated Wednesday in Puebla by members of the old 29th regiment.

The official statement says: "It is expected that the assassins will be summarily dealt with and that the entire regiment which is being mustered out of service will be punished."

The statement says that the 29th was Huerta's former command and its membership is composed of the "blue stockings of Mexico."

SULZER LOSES IN NEW YORK RACE

UTICA, N. Y., Aug. 28.—This complete ticket was placed in the field Thursday night by the Roosevelt progressive party after one of the most turbulent "conventions" held in this state for many years.

William Sulzer's hopes of capturing the nomination were shattered by a vote of 112 to 8 on a motion to substitute the name of Sulzer for that of Davenport. But the Sulzer element had made the convention boil for nine hours. Sulzer roared kept things in a turmoil. They charged the Roosevelt leaders with violating the direct primary law; claimed that they had been crushed by the Roosevelt "steam roller" and cried that the Roosevelt leaders were "doing to the people what Barnes and Penrose did to Roosevelt in Chicago two years ago."

Amid the chaos William Halpin of New York all but succeeded in stampeding the convention for Roosevelt himself as the nominee for governor.

When the ticket was announced there were cries of "hand picked candidates" answered by "shut up" and "put him out."

OYSTER BAY, N. Y., Aug. 28.—Thursday night when Col. Roosevelt heard of the slate made by the progressives at the Utica conference he said:

"It is an excellent ticket. I will do everything I can to help elect it. It is essentially a progressive ticket." He would not comment upon the turnout of Sulzer.

PRISONERS DISCHARGED

Were Accused of Being Inmates in
Opium Resort.

CHICAGO, Aug. 28.—Mrs. Julia Ruby, sister-in-law of Mayor O. H. Nelson of Lyons, Ill., and Robert Burns, who were arrested as inmates of an opium resort here by detectives from the state attorney's office were discharged Thursday afternoon by Municipal Judge Gimmet. Others taken in the raid were Eva Nelson, 14 years old, daughter of Mayor Nelson; Ralph Hines, said to have run the place; and James Bond, a colored man. The girl was released. The men held in bonds of \$10,000 each will have a hearing Friday.

TO CAUCUS NEXT WEEK

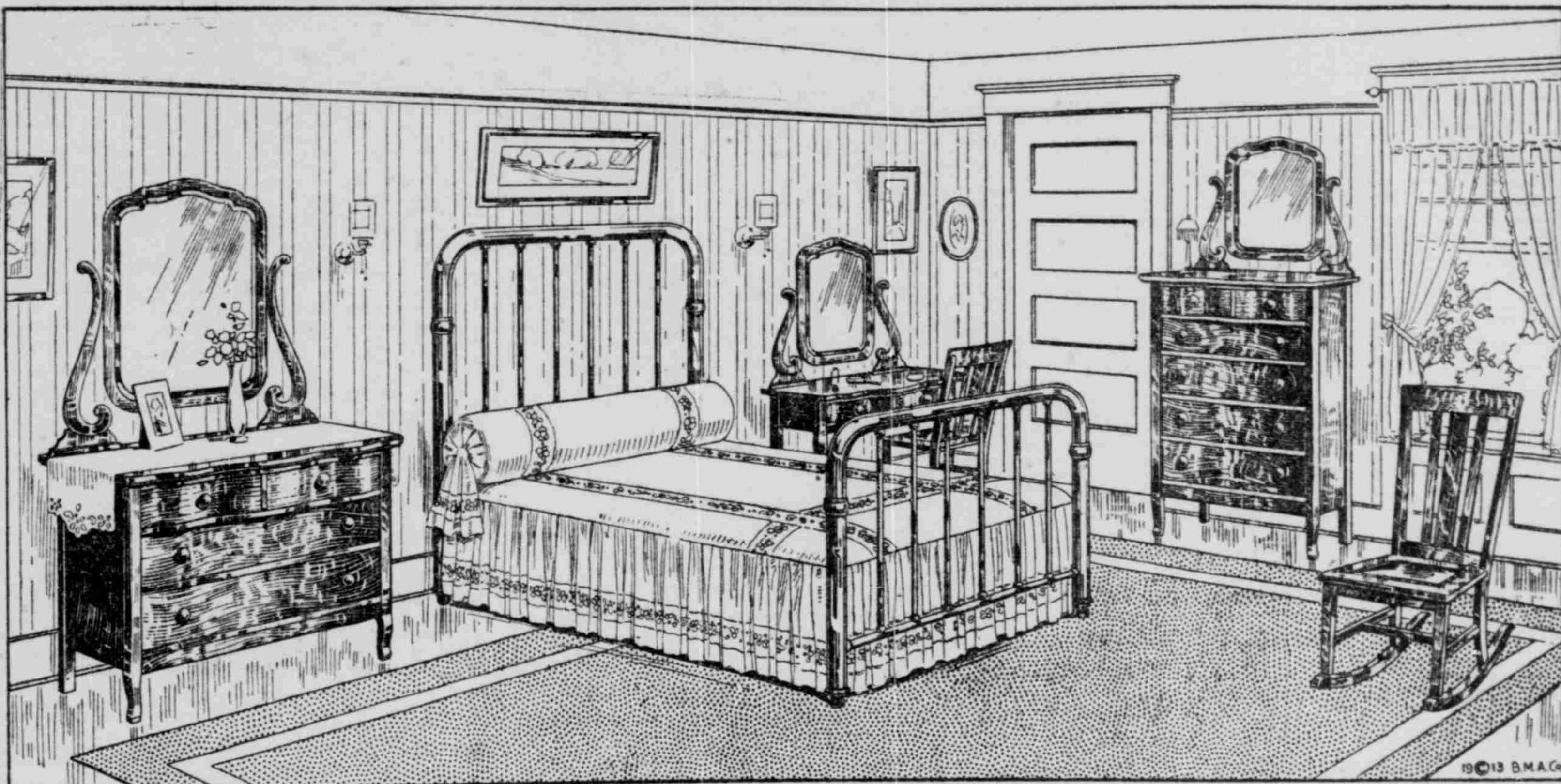

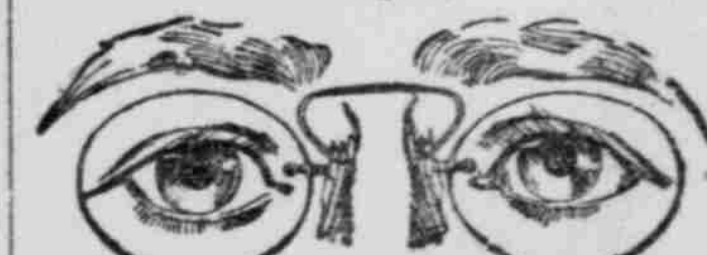
