

## TO PAY FARMERS FOR LOST CATTLE

About \$60,000 is to be Distributed Here as Result of Hoof and Mouth Epidemic—St. Mary's Worst Sufferer.

St. Joseph county farmers who sustained losses through the foot and mouth disease epidemic which raged throughout Indiana and Michigan for several months will receive reimbursement from the state within a short time as vouchers are already being made out at Indianapolis. Dr. A. F. Nelson, state veterinarian, is preparing the vouchers and the warrants which will be cashed by the state treasurer and will be issued by the auditor.

One-half of the loss to the cattle raisers who suffered from the epidemic is sustained by the state and the other by the federal government, which has already met its obligations in this respect. St. Joseph county will receive at least two-thirds of the approximate \$100,000 which will be distributed over Indiana by the state. St. Mary's academy suffered the most from the epidemic and will receive the largest amount from the state in this country, the sum being \$3,556. Haven H. Hubbard is second in the list with \$3,076.50, while Notre Dame university will receive \$1,593.54. The 18 counties beside St. Joseph which will receive money from the state will get approximately \$40,000 and the remainder of the \$100,000 will come to this county.

## Battle in East Prussia

### Greatest of all Times

Edward Fox, Correspondent, Tells of Watching Fight From Aeroplane—Germany Well Prepared For War.

NEW YORK, March 22.—"The last battle between Germans and Russians on the east Prussian frontier, when the 10th Russian army of 250,000 men was annihilated, was the greatest in the world's history," declared Edward Fox, an American correspondent who arrived from Germany Sunday on the Nieuw Amsterdam. Mr. Fox declared he witnessed the battle in a German armored aeroplane at a height of 3,000 feet.

"I am bringing with me photographic proof and documentary evidence of Russian atrocities in east Prussia," he continued. "I was also with the German army in Belgium and made very careful inquiry into the alleged German atrocities in that country, but was never able to come into direct contact with a single case. In one village I would be told of an atrocity that occurred in the next, and when I arrived there to investigate, was then told that it occurred in the next locality."

"It is simply amazing how strong and how many the resources of Germany are. The prices of foodstuffs in that country are much lower than in New York and there is enough ammunition to keep the eastern and

western armies supplied as long as the war lasts.

"Some of the officers on the staff of Gen. von Eichhorn told me that Russia is in a dangerous position. The Germans are coming up through Galicia, forming a half circle from the end of the front to the east Prussian end. This semi-circle will gradually close upon the Russians until they are annihilated."

"The Russians are fighting like devils because they know they are fighting for their very existence. They have already got every able bodied man enlisted in the active army and a great number of cripples."

"The Germans have 3,000,000 recruits now training ready for the spring campaign and these will more than offset Kitchener's new army. Altogether the position of the Germans is excellent."

"The difference between the campaigning of the Germans and Russians is easily seen along the east Prussian frontier. On the Russian side the villages, towns and homesteads are the same as they were before the war, but on the German side everything is in ruins."

## STEAMER IS FIRED ON BY AMERICAN GUNNERS

Adenwald, Hamburg-American Vessel, Tried to Leave Without Proper Papers.

SAN JUAN, Porto Rico, March 22.—The Hamburg-American steamer Adenwald, which has been running in and out of this port since the outbreak of the war and which was suspected of carrying supplies to the German sea raider Karlsruhe when she was in the West Indies, was fired on by the United States gunners at El Morro Sunday when she attempted to leave without clearance papers.

She was struck by a shell, but suffered no serious injury and returned to port.

The Adenwald left this port some time ago with 10,000 tons of coal and returned shortly afterward with her bunkers practically empty. On that occasion she went out without clearance papers and it was reported that the American officer in charge of the port had informed the captain of the Adenwald that if he tried that game again he would fire on the ship. The captain of the Adenwald applied for clearance papers on March 18 and they were refused pending instructions from Washington. He started out without them Sunday and the American commander kept his word.

### OWNED PART OF DACIA

NEW YORK, March 22.—Claiming a "gentleman's agreement" Esion von Novely, a ship broker at 13 Broadway, has made an affidavit that he owns 40 per cent of the Dacia, now before a French prize court. He alleges that Edward N. Breitung is not the sole owner and has served him with a summons. Von Novely who is an Austrian, states that the Dacia was sold, and put under American registry only on condition that she be used in trading with Germany, Austria or neutral countries.

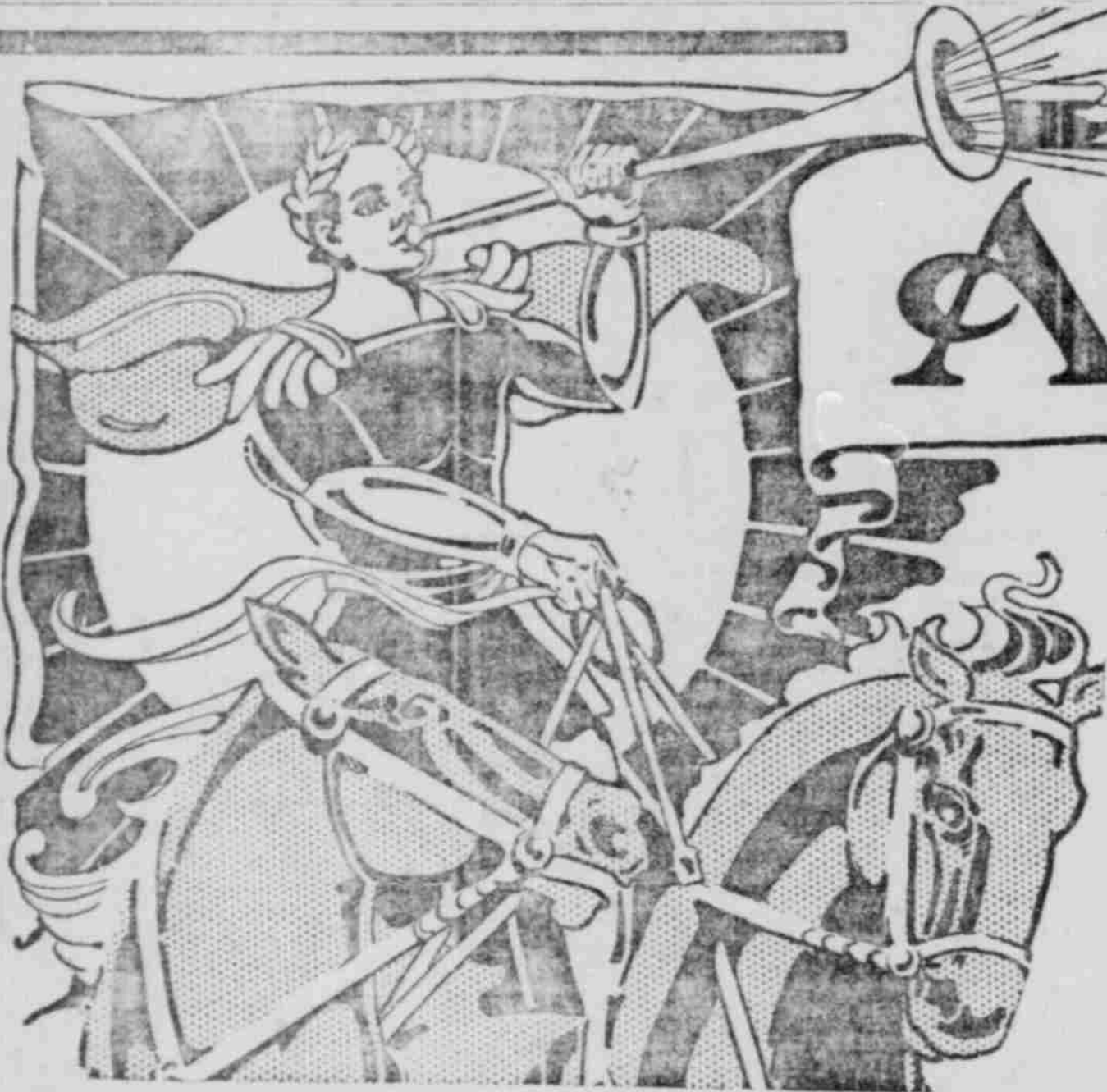
