ELKHART, Aug. 16.—City Clerk Verdon C. Miesner, in company with four other men, left this city today for Indianapolis, where he will enter the service of the United States army in the auto mechanics corps. The office of city clerk will be merged with that of the city controller next Monday and Harvey Elliott will be placed in charge.

Dr. A. R. Bassler and Miss Inez Cuddahy, both of this city, were married in Warsaw Tuesday night and returned to Elkhart Thursday morning. The bride, who is a former resident of Mishawaka, was employed as head nurse in the Bassler-Grossnickle hospital here. The groom recently passed his examination for a commission in the medical reserve corps and expects daily to be called to the colors.

Miss Bernice Hemp, sister of the groom, acted as bridesmaid, and Herbert Bohren was best man. Following the ceremony a three-course dinner was served by the bride's mother. Only the immediate families were present. Mr. and Mrs. Hemp will leave shortly for the east, where they will spend their honeymoon. They will make their home in Elkhart.

A meeting of auto accessory dealers and operators of oil filling stations in Elkhart will be called within the next week for the purpose of deciding definitely as to whether or not the business men will comply with the request of the government and close their places of business at 6 o'clock each evening in the future.

The early fall of leaves, due to the intense warm weather and drought, is causing the street department no end of trouble. Street Commissioner Earl New stated Thursday that the city was wholly unprepared to meet the unusual condition, but it is extending every possible effort in an attempt to keep the streets and sewers of the city clean.

The bakery license of George L. Beck of Millersburg was Thursday suspended by County Food Administrator H. H. Gortner because Beck used insufficient substitutes in baking bread, and that he also failed to make reports as required by the administration. He must suspend his baking business for 30 days.

Fifty-eight June, 1918, registrants who are in class one received their first lessons in military instruction under the recent federal order, and their showing was so favorable that they were openly commended by their instructors, Capt. Coroner Holderman of this city conducted an inquest. Funeral services will be held at the home Friday and burial will be made in the Mottville cemetery.

Mrs. T. H. Brown and young daughter are ill Thursday as the result of eating "munchies," which are prize pieces of candy placed in boxes of crackerjack. Mr. Brown, who is yardmaster here for the New York Central railroad, purchased the crackerjack Wednesday. There were four pieces of the prize candy in the box and as soon as the mother and daughter had each eaten a piece they became drowsy and later became violently ill. Dr. I. W. Short, who is attending the victims, has placed sample pieces of the candy in the hands of the police and intends to investigate the case thoroughly.

The Elkhart Bar association will hold its annual picnic at Eagle lake next Wednesday, according to a decision made at a meeting of the organization Thursday.

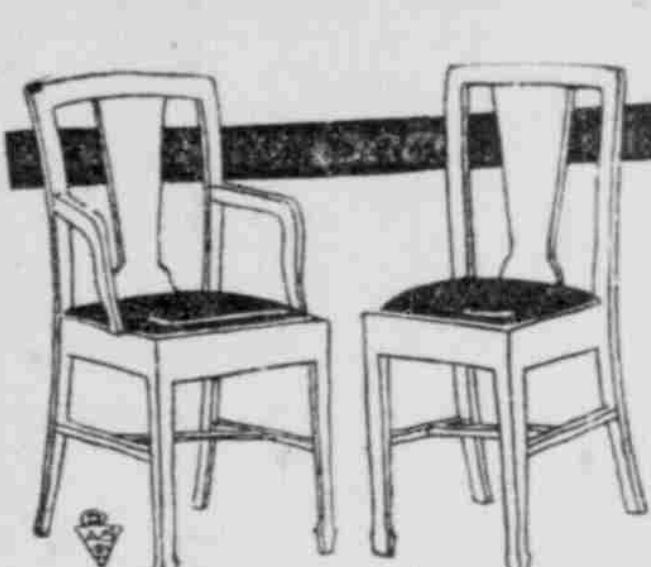
Week of Nov. 11  
Set for Great  
War Fund Drive

NEW YORK, Aug. 16.—The week of Nov. 11 has been set for the great war fund drive to raise \$122,500,000 for war work of the Y. M. C. A., Y. W. C. A., the War Camp community service and the American Library association, according to an announcement made here Thursday night by representatives of the four organizations.

The Y. M. C. A. will receive \$100,000,000 from the fund, the Y. W. C. A. \$15,000,000; the War Camp community service \$15,000,000, and the Library association \$5,000,000.

The Knights of Columbus, the Jewish Welfare league and the Salvation Army, the only other three war relief organizations recognized by the government, will be asked to join in a similar campaign to be launched in January, 1919. It was impossible to arrange for these organizations to take part in the November campaign. The plan to combine the seven appeals in two campaigns is said to have the sanction of President Wilson and Sec'y of War Baker.

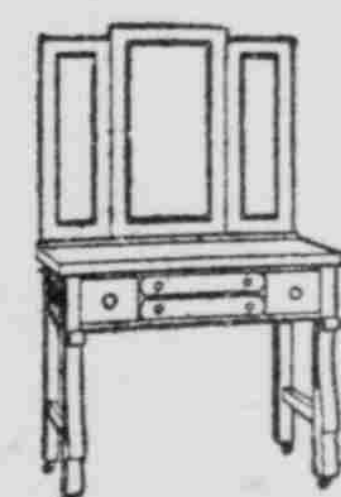

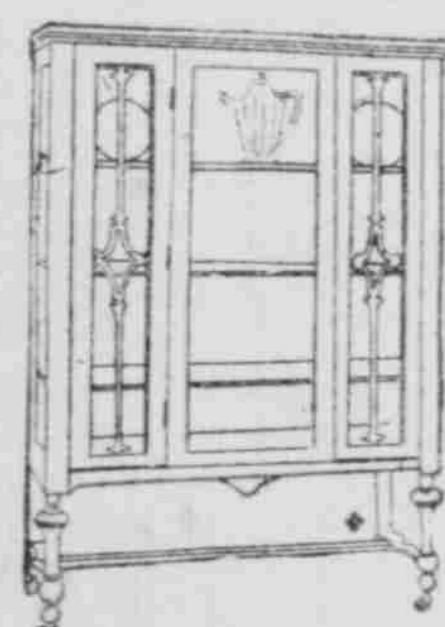

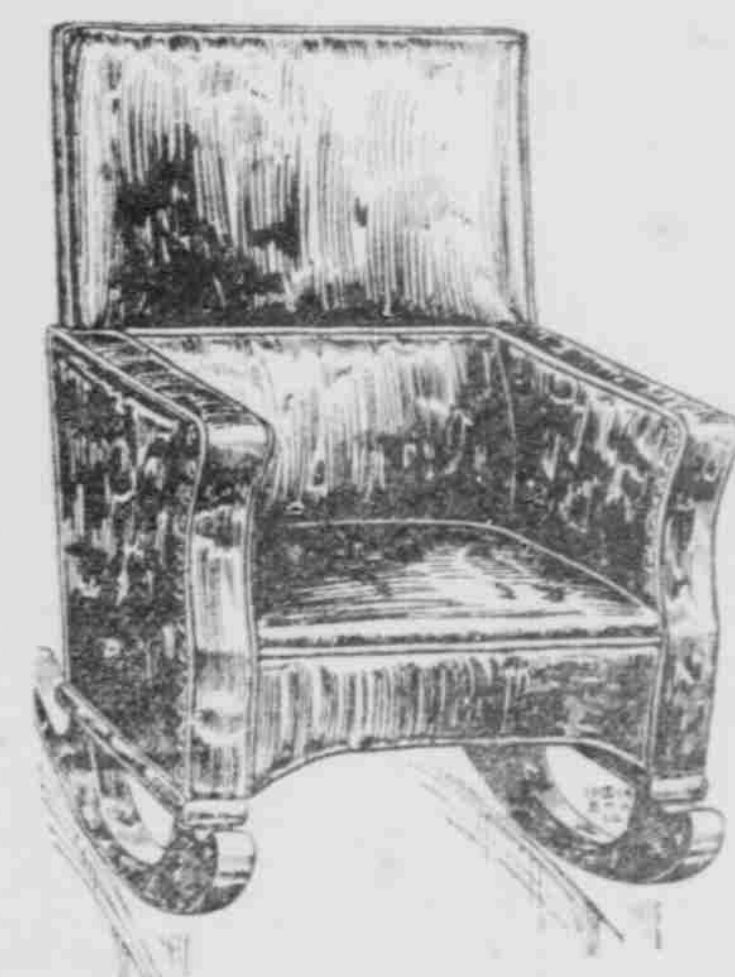
