Secret Correspondence Shows German-Magyar Conspiracy Against the Throne of Austria.

NEW YORK, March 28 -- George creel, former chairman of the committee on public information, made public here last night a summary of the secret correspondence of Count Czernin, late foreign minister of Austria-Hungary, which was turned over to Edgar Sisson at Prague by the custodian official of the Bohemian government on Jan. 24 last. One of the most sensational of the disclosures was that there was a German-Magyar conspiracy against the Archduke Francis Ferdinand, heirapparent to the throne of Austria, who was assassinated at Sarajevo on June 28, 1914, because he was considered a rival of the then Em-

Mr. Creel said Mr. Sisson accepted the privilege of using the correspondence in behalf of the United States government. 
