

WORLD AT WAR WITH CHRIST

Dr. Cavanaugh Points Out
Strife During Sermon at
Summer School.

Formal opening of the second session of the University of Notre Dame summer school took place Sunday morning at 8:15 o'clock in the Sacred Heart chapel. The Very Rev. Dr. John Cavanaugh, C. S. C., the retiring president of the University, addressed some 550 students registered for the summer term.

The Rev. Dr. Mathew Schumacher, C. S. C., dean of the summer school officiated at solemn high mass. Dr. Schumacher was assisted by the Rev. Thomas A. Burke, C. S. C., Prefect of Discipline and the Rev. Joseph Burke, C. S. C., Head of the Preparatory Department, as deacon and subdeacon respectively. The Rev. William Connor, C. S. C., superior of St. Joseph's Novitiate, was the master of ceremonies.

Preceding high mass an academic procession took place from the university parlors to the chapel. Two acolytes with a cross bearer preceded the procession; priests of the Holy Cross and members of the faculty clad in cap and gown participated in the procession. Dr. Schumacher, the celebrant at mass and the two deacons were dressed in maroon dalmatics, the official church vestments for the occasion of the third Sunday after Pentecost.

Christ, the Teacher.

Preaching on "Christ, the Teacher," Dr. Cavanaugh said:

"The truest thing that can be said about whatever is good in the world today is that it is the working out of the teachings of Christ.

"If liberty-loving men are permitted to dwell in peace under liberty-giving governments, the preacher added, they owe this boon to Christ.

In part Dr. Cavanaugh said: "If the home is sacred, if marriage is honored, if domestic virtue is practiced, if innocence walks safe in the streets or sleeps at home in security, if honor between states and individuals is recognized as an essential duty, if justice sits enthroned in the judgment chamber, life and property are protected and the pursuit of happiness recognized as a legitimate aspiration of all mankind, it is to the teaching of Christ that we owe all of these things. The world is His school and all mankind are called to learn of him.

"It is true that His teachings have never been accepted universally and His discipline never perfectly received and practiced. Even in the ages of deepest, strongest faith there were abuses in government, abuses in the home, abuses among men in their dealings with each other, abuses even in the Church itself, but all of these things have come, in no single instance, from the teachings of Christ. They have come from the neglect or positive denials of His lessons, through the weakness or obstinacy of the human will, through which alone the grace of God can function in the world.

From the beginning of Christianity institutions and men and philosophies and movements, while enjoying here and there a temporary triumph, have failed in the end just in proportion as they rejected Christ, the Teacher, and turned away from His light.

At War With Christ.

"It is too much to say that the world today, more than ever before, is at war with Christ? Is it too much to say that Christ is almost banished from His own civilization? Geographically, Asia, Africa and the islands of the sea are professedly hostile to Christ, except where here and there in some hut in the wilderness half-starved, a lonely missionary keeps alive the light of Christ on the altar of heroic sacrifice. In Europe the vast territory that was once the Russian Empire has been for centuries in schism, and today seems farther than ever removed from Christ. A large number of smaller countries are writing in the agencies of radical thought, their eyes red, their hands and mouths bloody, their judgment turned to insanity. In what has been the enormous German empires of Germany and Austria, there are chaos, socialism, bitter black despair. In the other countries of Europe where peace seems to be established and even throughout the vast expanse of the whole American continent, there is in nearly all cases a heretical power in the ascendancy. And this is true of not only government itself, but of all other things that go to make up civilization. Particularly during the last 50 years, the vast majority of the universities of the world have been engaged in the death grapple with Christianity. For a long time scientific men have gone to the extreme limit in the attempt to prove that science had deified Christ. Whatever may be said of past centuries, this at least is true today: a vast preponderance of human genius, the material resources of mankind in wealth and power and prestige, the popular prejudices and suspicions, the calumnies of history, the pretentious claims of philosophy, the subtle persuasiveness of the school, the dynamic energies of romance and poetry, and all forms of human recreation, not to speak of the phalanxes of organized vice, are drawn up almost solidly against the Catholic church and the power of Christ. In their dealings with each other, the nations of the world are daily demonstrating anew that, in fact at least, there is a such thing as inter-racial morality; that today, as in the days of tower and flood, men follow

Provincial Chapter of Holy Cross Begins Tuesday

Superiors of the Holy Cross seminary, St. Joseph's novitiate, DuJarie institute and other outside colleges which are branches of the Holy Cross congregation.

Among those who will sit in the

chapter will be the Very Rev. Dr. John Cavanaugh, C. S. C., the retiring president; the Rev. Thomas A. Irving, C. S. C., superior of the Holy Cross seminary; the Rev. William Connor, C. S. C., superior of St. Joseph's novitiate; Brother Aidan, superior of DuJarie institute; Brother Maymus, rector of Holy Trinity high school in Chicago; president of St. Joseph college, Cincinnati, O.; president of Columbia university, Portland, Ore.; president of St. Edward's college, Austin, Tex.; rector of the Sacred Heart college, Watertown, Wis.; superior of Holy Cross seminary in Washington, D. C.; rectors of the Holy Cross high schools in Fort Wayne and Indianapolis and the superiors of the Holy Cross parishes in South Bend.

The very Rev. Dr. Andrew Morrissey, C. S. C., provincial of the congregation, will preside at the chapter meeting.
