Iowa Leads in Poultry.

It is worth while to note that Iowa leads all the other states in the value of its poultry. Sold on the market when the last federal census was taken it would have brought \$12,270,000—over \$6 a head of the population of the state. Missouri ranks second to Iowa in the value of its poultry, with \$11,871,000. The eight states next in order are Illinois, \$11,697,000; Ohio, \$9,533,000; New York, \$7,879,000; Indiana, \$7,762,000; Pennsylvania \$7,674,000; Kansas, \$7,377,000; Michigan, \$5,611,000, and Texas, \$4,807,000. In these ten states together the value of poultry is \$86,481,000, or 55.9 per cent of the total value of poultry in continental United States.

The census bureau reports 280,000,000 chickens on the farms of the nation. They are worth to the farmer, 50 cents apiece. Also at last accounts, there were on the farms 3,688,700 turkeys, 2,906,500 ducks, 4,432,000 geese, 1,765,000 guinea fowls, 2,731,000 pigeons, 3,445,000 colonies of bees. The poultry population increased 18 per cent in ten years. The value of the poultry in the same period jumped 80 per cent. The human population in ten years rose 21 per cent.

At the farm each turkey is worth, on an average, \$1.79; each duck 64 cents; each goose, 72 cents; each guinea fowl, 35 cents; each pigeon, 28 cents, and each colony of bees, \$3.01. There are over 5,300 ostriches in the country, valued at \$1,700,000. Most of them are in Arizona.
