CONSOLIDATION OF RURAL SCHOOLS

Question Will be Voted on at Argyle if Sufficient Number of Names Can be Signed to the

MOVEMENT IS STARTED

Speaker Was at Argyle Last Week and the Proposal Was Freely Discussed Then.

ARGYLE, Iowa, Feb. 8.—The consolidated school question has come to the fore at Argyle. The progressive group of farmers, who have instigated the community movement here, are determined that the question of education has kent before the tion of education be kept before public until that question is settled, and settled right. These people realize that there can be no great com-munity movement here without a proper kind of school. People are not attracted toward a community that neglects its educational facilities. Progressive farmers will not come, and bring their families, to the country-side that has not a good church and school. Our progressive citizens

realize this. That is why they will keep on agitating the school queswhether the proper settlement The present proposed settlement of the school question here is by the establishment of a consolidated school. A goodly number of people favor this form of school as the solutions of the school as the school tion of our educational problem. Whether a majority does as yet, or not, remains to be seen at an election that will soon be held. People sin-cerely differ in America on educational questions, and most of our people who do not favor the consolidated school are doubtless sincere i their convictions. The old argument, "What was good enough for me, is good enough for the children now," is used only rarely by people. In Iowa, progressive state that she is, that argument has but little weight today. Some people, too, use the argument of higher taxes as their reason for the state of the opposing the consolidated school This seems to be the strongest argument of the opposition, as it is in many places. Those favoring the school freely admit that the taxes will be higher, but they point out that the school tax in the proposed district is at present much lower than in other districts in Lee county. They also take the broad view of the question and say that the added advant ages which come to the children with the consolidated school are worth paying for in somewhat higher taxes. Furthermore, they realize that the value of property here will increase as better education comes. That is doubtless one reason why many are favoring the school. Among those
